ties, one of 100 mind the other of 30 Horfe of the Lu-Menburg Troops, have this week appeared in the Lower Alface: it is faid they had a defignito intercept the Commillary of Haguenum who was abroad.

Cologne, Nov. 13. The Ofnabrug Troops having threatned to revenge the repulse they received at Lin, our Elector has reinforced the Garifon that was there before with 50 men from Nais. The two Brandenburg Regiments that were in this Diocels, are matched towards the Countrey of Cleve. From Triers and those parts we have advice, that the Confederate Troops under the command of the Duke of Zell, continued en-Eamped near Deuxponts, into which place the Mareschal de Crequi had put a very sufficient Garison, and was himfelf polled with the Forces under his command near Sarbruck, to observe the motions of the faid Confederates; our Letters add, that it was believed the Duke of Zell would very quickly put his Troops into Winterquarters, and that the Baggage of the Imperial detache-ment commanded by Major-General Dunemair, had already repaffed the Khine; and just now we have advice that the Ofnabrug Troops, and the two Dutch Regiments which were marching towards the Mofelle, are coming back into this Diocels, where they are to winter.

Liege, Nov. 13. The French are at work at Verviers, to demolifh it; as they mean to do to Stauelat, Malmedi, Sp1, Theux and Hoye. It is fill faid that a Convoy of Todoo men is expected at Maeffricht from Charleroy, and that they will take their march through Condrets; it's faid their chief businefs is to convoy a confiderable Train of Artillery, which is more than what they have the fort at Maeffricht to Charleroy. Some will fay that the Prench intend to quit Limburg towards Spring.

Higue, Nov. 17: As yet the Court of Jultice hath not pronounced any Sentence against the Sieur de Groot, and many are of opinion there will be none, and that he will be acquitted without that formality. The States of Holland will not be affembled till the 24 inftant, when we may expect to hear that fomething will be refoved as well concerning the work of the Peace, as the continuing the War, if that be not made this winter. We have Letters from Nimeguen of the 14 inftanr, which fay, that the Mediators laboured very much with the Ambaffadors upon the place, in order to the giving the Treaty a beginning, but that there wanted ftill the Ambaffadors of fome of the principal parties. There is Indeed fome discourse in Town that the Prince of Orange intends to pass into Zealand to fettle the matter in difference about Dr. Momma, but the certainty we as yer know nor. It is faid that the States have within these few days received Letters from the Duke of Zell, in which he acquaints them, that he was arrived with the Confederate Troops under his command near Deuxponts, and that it had been refolved to make an attempt upon that place, which is of no great firength, bue supplyed at prefent with a very strong Garison. All our Letters from Strasburg inform us, that the Duke of Lorrdin intended to decamp from Schlingen the 15 inflant, in order to his putting his Troops into Winterquatters which were affigned them by the Emperor in Suabia and Franconias though fome Letters add, that a confiderable part of the Imperial Troops, would go and winter in the Emperors Hereditary Countrys. Yellerday his Excellency the Lord Berkely, Ambaffador and Pledipotentiary of his Majelly of Great Britain for the Treaty of Peace at Ninteguen, parted hence for Amsterdam, from whence he intended to proceed to Nimeguen. 'Yesterday was his Highnesses birth day, when he was 26 years old.

Bruffels, Nov. 17. We expect with fome impatience the arrival of the Spanish Ordinary, which we promise out felves will bring Bills of Exchange for a Million of Crowns at least, to be employed for the making the neceffary preparations against the next Campagne. Our Governor General has appointed in the mean while a review to be made of all the Forces at prefent in the fervice of these Provinces; and we are told that fome Troops will be reformed to make up others. From Germany they write, that the Duke of Deuxposts had fupplyed the Duke of Zells Forces with 15000 Measures of Corn; which the Spaniards are to repay at Treves, and that all parties were preparing to go into their Winter-quarters.

Whitebal, Nov. 10. His Majefly having left it to the Queen to nominate Her pew Lord Chamberlain, Her Majefly was pleafed to make choice of the Right Honourable the Earl of Offory for that Office, and accordingly this day gave him the Key; and His Mjaefly to fhew his approbation of the faid Choice, hath declared that his Lord this thall also continue in the place he had before of Gentleman of His Majeflies Bedchamber.

Ditte, Now. 12 His Majefly having been gracioufly pleafed to tranflate the Right Reverend Father in God DoGor Sparrow late Bifhop of Exter to the Sec of Norwich, and to make choice of the Reverend DoGoe Thomas Lamplugb Dean of Rockefter to fucceed in the Bifhoprick of Exter, this day was performed the Solemnity of his Confeoration in the Chappel of Lamberb, by the Right Reverend Father in God Henry Lord Bifhop of Lon-1 don, his-Grace of Camerbury's Commiffioner for that purpofes affifted by feveral other Bifhops, in the prefence of many of the chiefeft of the Nobility, and other perfons of Quality, who were afterwards entertained at a noble Dinner.
