ESTERDAY being the Anniversary of her Imperial Majesty's Birth-day, there was a very brilliant and numerous Court in the Morning; and in the Evening a
Ball and Supper, both which the Empress honoured
with her Prefence, being the only Time her Imperial Majesty has supped in publick for many Years.

It was a very supper the Order of St. Alexander

Upon this Occasion, the Order of St. Alexander was given to General Potemkin, and the same Mark of Distinction sent to M. Reinstorp, Governor of Oremberg, accompanied with a Present of fifteen thousand Roubles. General Biblikow was promoted from the Rank of Major to that of Lieutenant-Colonel of General Bibikow was promoted from the the Guards. An Express arrived from this Officer on Saturday Night last, with an Account, that Prince Galitzin had again engaged a Body of the Rebels, commanded by their Chief, on the Borders of the Yaick; which he entirely defeated, Pugatcheff escaping with only fourteen Mcn. It seems that after the former Action he found Means to assemble some Thousands of the Fugitives, with which he engaged a fecond Time with the above Corps. When the Express came away General Bibikow was near Oremberg, and so ill of a Fever as to be scarcely able to fign the Report.

Engaged as we are by every Motive of Duty and Interest to wish the Continuance of the British Sceptre in your illustrious House, we regard every Addition to your Royal Family as a new Pledge of the Securities of our Religion and Li-We adore the Goodness of God, who, by

the flourishing State of your Royal House, and the persevering Wisdom and Clemency of your Government, affords us so much Reason to be grateful for the Happiness which we now enjoy, and for the suture Prospects which are before us.

W Hereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, in the Morning of the 3d Instant; the Boat belonging to the Hawke Cutter, in the Service of His Majesty's Customs at the Port of Falmouth, coming round Deadman Point, was chaced by a large new Irifo Cutter of about One Hundred Tons Burthen, mounted with Eight Carriage and Twenty Swivel Guns, with Twenty five Men on Board, and forced on Shore; and that the Crew of the said Cutter fired a great Number of Shot from their Carriage and Swivel Guns at the Boat, in order to destroy her and the Persons on Board the said Boat, and continued so siring for a considerable Time after they were got on Shore, and were climbing up the Hill at the Deadman Point; after which they gave Chace to the Hawke Cutter, and forced her into the said Port: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Offence, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be complice or Accomplished thereof.
