St. James's, June 4.

THIS being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Birth-Day, the same was observed at Court; where there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on the Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park, and at the Tower, were fired; and in the Evening there will be a Ball at Court; and Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

Westminster, June 2.

THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons, by Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that the Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great-Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for the better providing suitable Quarters for Officers and Soldiers in His Majesty's Service in North America.

An Act for repealing an Act made in the First Year of the Reign of King Henry the Fifth, and so much of several Acts, of the Eighth-Tenth, and Twenty-third Years of King Henry the Sixth, as relates to the Residence of Persons to be elected Members to serve in Parliament, or of the Persons by whom they are to be chosen.

An Act for preserving the Health of Prisoners in Goal, and preventing the Goal Distemper.

An Act for indemnifying the Innkeepers and Victuallers within the Hundred of Godley in the County of Surrey, against the Penalties to which they are or may be liable, for selling Ale, Beer, Wine, or Spirituous Liquors, without proper Licences, upon certain Conditions.

An Act to explain so much of an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, (intituled, An Act to regulate the Importation and Exportation of Corn) as relates to the Method of ascertaining the Prices of Corn and Grain exported.

An Act to alter and amend an Act passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, (intituled, An Act for annexing certain Forfeited Estates, in Scotland, to the Crown unalienably; and for making Satisfaction to the lawful Creditors thereupon; and to establish a Method of managing the same, and applying the Rents and Profits

thereof for the better civilizing and improving the Highlands of Scotland, and preventing Disorders there for the Future,) so far as the same relates to the granting Leases of the said Estates.

An Act to continue the several Laws therein mentioned, for granting Liberty to carry Rice from His Majesty's Provinces of Carolina and Georgia, in America, directly to any Part of Europe Southward of Cape Finisterre; for granting the like Liberty to export Rice from South Carolina and Georgia, directly to any Part of America to the Southward of the said Provinces; for granting the like Liberty in the Exportation of Rice from East and West Florida, and from any Part of America, Southward of South Carolina and Georgia.

An Act for the Repeal of all former Acts concerning the Longitude at Sea, except so much thereof as relates to the Appointment and Authority of the Commissioners thereby constituted; and also such Clauses as relate to the constructing, printing, publishing, vending, and licensing, of Nautical Almanacks, and other useful Tables, and for the more effectual Encouragement and Reward of such Person and Persons as shall discover a Method for finding the same, or shall make useful Discoveries in Navigation; and for the better making Experiments relating thereto.

An Act to prevent Frauds in the buying and selling of Hops.

An Act to repeal so much of an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, for reducing into One Act the general Laws relating to Turnpike Roads, as exempts Persons from the Payment of Tolls at Side Gates created at Places specified in any Act of Parliament.

An Act for building a Bridge cross the River Ais, at Carlton, in the West Riding of the County of York.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Twenty-second Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing the Road from North Shields in the County of Northumberland, to the Town of Newcastle upon Tyne.

An Act for continuing the Term, and enlarging the Powers, granted by an Act passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, for repairing the Road from the North End of Brown's Lane, in Great Stoughton, in the County of Huntingdon, through Kimbolton and Higham Ferrers, to the Way Post near Wellingborough Bridge in the County of Northampton, and from the Pound in Kimbolton, to the Way Post in Great Catworth Field, near Brington Bridge in the said County of Huntingdon; and for repealing so much of an Act of the Tenth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, as relates to the Road between the North End of Brown's Lane, and the South End thereof.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of so much of an Act made in the Fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the Road from the Town of Rotherham in the County of York, to the Turnpike Road at the East End of Tankersley Park in the said County.

An Act for empowering the Trustees for repairing the Road from the Stones End in Saint Leonard Shoreditch,

to the utmost Part of the Northern Road, in the Parish of Ensea in the County of Middlesex, to cause Part of the said Road to be lighted, watched, and watered; and for lighting, watching, and watering, the Parish of Saint Mary, Stoke Newington, in the said County.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Twenty-seventh Year of King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Road from the Borough of Leicester, to and by the North Side of the Town of Uppingham in the County of Rutland, and to Wansford in the County of Northampton, and from thence to Peterborough in the said County of Northampton; and for repairing the Road from the Termination of the said Road at Peterborough, to the Market Place there.

And to Seven private Bills.

St. James's, June 1.

This Day Ibrahim Aga, Ambassador from Tripoli, had an Audience of Leave of His Majesty.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Suffolk, (in the Absence of the Right Honourable the Earl of Rochford) one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, June 4.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Precentor and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St. David, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Dr. Charles Mofs, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Bath and Wells; and a Letter recommending to the said Precentor and Chapter the Honourable James York, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of St. David.

Petersburg, May 10. Since General Bibikow's Death a third Engagement has taken Place between a Detachment from Prince Galitzin's Corps and a Party of the Rebels commanded by Pugatcheff, in which the latter were defeated; and Pugatcheff having retired to the Baschkires, who are not much attached to him, it is hoped he will soon be taken by the Russian Troops.

An Account is lately arrived of the Defeat of a considerable Body of Kuban Tartars, who had revolted from this Government.

Florence, May 17. A Quarrel happened here last Week between the Soldiers and the Sbirri, occasioned by the Seizing, and cruelly Treating, a Grenadier in a Part of the Town where the Soldiers are not permitted to go; the Consequence of which was, that the Soldiers forced their Way out of the Fortrefs, and proceeded to the Town-House, where the Sbirri reside, the Gates of which not being shut, a Skirmish ensued in the Court-Yard, in which a Grenadier was killed; this exasperated the Soldiers, as well as the Rabble, who took Part with them, and a general Insurrection was apprehended. However, by this Time, General Capponi, Commander in Chief of the Troops, General Goes the Great Duke's Adjutant, the Secretary at War, and the Fiscal, were come to the Town-House; but neither their Menaces nor Persuasions could induce the Mob to retire, till a few Light Horse arrived and dispersed them, when the Grenadiers also returned to the Fortrefs, and to the Main Guard from whence they came. The Light Horse patrolled the Streets all

that Day and Part of the Night; the Grenadiers were immediately disarmed and the Sbirri confined in the Town-House. The Great Duke held Councils of War twice a Day for several Days, during which forty Dragoons were sent from Pisa, and Processes were ordered against the Soldiers and the Sbirri; the Result of which was, that two Companies of Grenadiers should be sent to Porto Ferrajo in the Island of Elba; and two Sbirri, who had fired Pistols from the Windows of the Town-House, and wounded two of the Mob, were condemned to the Gallies for Life; and Yesterday the Grenadiers were escorted by the Dragoons to a Place seven Miles distant from the Town, where Barks are provided to carry them to Leghorn, from whence they are to be conducted to Porto Ferrajo, on Board two of the Great Duke's Frigates, which have been prepared for that Purpose.

Stockholm, May 17. This Morning the Countess of Fern, together with four Ladies of the Court and three Noblemen, set out for Carlscrona, where they will embark for Wismar, on board the Sophia Albertina Ship of War of seventy four Guns, which is to be accompanied by two Frigates. As soon as Advice of their Arrival reaches the Court of Eutin, the future Dutchess of Sudermania, it be conducted to Wimar, and received on the Swedish Territory by Baron Hopker President of that Tribunal, who is appointed the King of Sweden's Commissary for this Purpose, and who is to accompany her Royal Highness to this City.

His Swedish Majesty has left it at the Option of the Bishop of Lubeck to have the Nuptials celebrated by Proxy either at Eutin or Wismar.

Vienna, May 21. General Haddick is promoted to the Rank of Field Marshal, and Count Wrabla is appointed Chancellor of Galicia, &c.

Berlin, May 24. Last Thursday Evening His Prussian Majesty arrived at Charictenbourg: He came next Morning to this City, and reviewed in the Park several Regiments which had marched hither from the different Quarters in the Neighbourhood. On the three following Mornings his Majesty reviewed a Body of Thirty Thousand Men, of which about Four Thousand were Cavalry; and expressed great Satisfaction at the Exactness with which both the Infantry and Cavalry performed their respective Evolutions. His Majesty returned to Potsdam Yesterday immediately after the Review.

His Prussian Majesty sets out on Thursday next for Magdebourg; from whence His Majesty will return to Potsdam, and then pursue his annual Progress to Pomerania and West Prussia. The Prince of Prussia will accompany his Majesty in that Journey, which will last eight Days longer than has been usual, his Majesty not intending to be back till the 20th of June.

Yesterday being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness Prince Ferdinand of Prussia, his Brother Prince Henry in the Evening gave a splendid Entertainment to the Court and Nobility, which was succeeded by a Ball, to which all the Foreign Ministers were invited.

Paris May 29. By the Accounts from Choisy we learn that the Physicians are of Opinion that her Royal Highness Madame Adelaide is not in Danger. Her Royal Highness Madame Sophie is much mended; and her Royal Highness Madame Victoire has not as yet had any bad Symptom.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Majesty, That a Turnpike Gate, erected across the Road in the Tything of Baynton in the Parish of Edington in the County of Wilts, by Order of the Trustees acting under an Act of Parliament passed in Ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Third, intituled, "An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act passed in the Thirty first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, For amending the Road from Pengate to Larchetts Bridge, and other Roads in the County of Wilts, and for amending several Roads near adjoining to the said Roads," was, on the 1st of February last past, in the Night Time, wilfully, maliciously and feloniously, taken down and greatly damaged by some Person or Persons unknown; and that, on the 16th of the same Month of February,

the said Turnpike Gate, after being repaired and again erected, was also in the Night Time wilfully, maliciously and feloniously, intirely destroyed by some Person or Persons likewise unknown; and that, on the Fourth of April last past, the Toll House, which was lately new built for the Use of the Collectors appointed to receive the Toll ordered to be collected at the Tything of Baynton aforesaid, was also in the Night Time wilfully, maliciously and feloniously, greatly damaged by being blown up with Gunpowder, and was thereby rendered utterly uninhabitable; and the Collector and his Wife, then residing therein, were violently assaulted and greatly bruised, and were forcibly turned out of the said Toll House by about Ten Persons disguised, and dressed in what are called Smock or Carters Frocks, and who are likewise unknown: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in either of the said Felonies, doth hereby promise His most gracious Pardon to any one who shall make Discovery of his, her, or their, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Felonies, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
