I reflect, with the greatest Satisfaction, that the many Difficulties and Embarrassiments, which appeared at our first Meeting, have been furmounted and removed to ably and effectually, as to answer my warment Wishes, and to exceed my most fanguine Expectations.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons. I have His Majefty's express Commands to thank you, in His Name, for the extraordinary and feasionable Supplies, which you have granted, and which His Majefty juftly confiders as a con-fpicuous Inflance of your Attachment to His Haush Parfon and Government, and I am to affire Royal Perfon and Goverment; and I am to affure you, that they are as gracioufly and favourably ac-cepted, as they have been liberally and chearfully given. It is a firiking Proof of your Wifdom and Sagacity, that the Means which you have used for raising the Supplies have not only sup-ported His Majefty's Government, but have, at the fame Time, raifed and established Publick and Private Credit, and promoted the Commerce, Manufactures, and Industry, of the Kingdom.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I should have reviewed my Administration with little Satisfaction to myfelf, if, while fo much had been done for the honourable Support of Govern-ment, no Acquisition had been obtained for this Country. This reciprocal Intercoufe of Duty and Protection, which has for fo many Years happily prevailed, and from which fo many falutary Con-fequences have been derived, during His Majesty's sufficients Reign, holds out, to every Part of His aufpicious Reign, holds out, to every Part of His Majefty's Empire, an Example reflecting the higheft Honour upon the Virtues of a most amiable and excellent Sovereign, and the Wildom and good Conduct of affectionate and loyal Subjects.

In the high Station, in which His Majefty has placed me, I claim no Merit, but a faithful Execution of His Majefty's gracious Purpofes, for the Happinels of His People of Ireland, and the moft just, and therefore the most favourable Representations of their loyal, dutiful, and affectionate Con-duct, which cannot fail to intitle them to the Con-

tinuance of His Royal Favour and Protection. Your favourable Acceptance of my Endeavours to do my Duty, and your kind Approbation of my Conduct, expressed in Terms to very diffin-guilhed and honourable to me, demand my warmeft Acknowledgments. I have fincerely withed to deferve your good Opinion; it is my earnest Defire to cultivate and improve it, and my unal-

terable Refolution to exert my most strenuous Efforts, at all Times, and upon all Occasions, to promote the Happinels and Prosperity of Ireland.
