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T Dublin Castle, June 2. 1774.
HIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers; and being seated on the Throne with the usual Ceremony, his Excellency sent for the Commons, and gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills:

An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, the yearly Sums therein mentioned; and for the better Support of the Foundling Hospital and Workhouse of the City of Dublin, and for increasing the Fund thereof.

An Act for the better regulating the Office of County Treasurer, and the Duty of Clerks of the Crown in respect of Presentments; and to enable the grand Jury of the County of Wicklow to raise Money by Presentments, for purchasing of Ground or Houses adjoining to the Court-House of the said County, for the Purpose of building Additions to the said Court-House.

An Act for the better and more certain Valuation of Houses in Counties of Cities and Counties of Towns.

An Act for amending the Laws relative to the lighting and cleansing of several Cities, and for establishing of Market Fairs therein, and for other Purposes.

An Act for amending an Act passed in the third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the better Regulation of the Linen and Hempen Manufactures.

An Act for Paving the Streets, Lanes, Quays, Bridges, Squares, Courts, and Alleys within the City and County of the City of Dublin, and other Purposes relative to the said City of Dublin, and other Places therein particularly mentioned.

An Act for the better Regulation of the Admission and Practice of Attornies.

An Act for amending two Acts passed in the last Sessions, the one intituled, An Act for the Relief of poor Infants who are or shall be deserted by their Parents; the other intituled, An Act for preventing the spreading of Fires, and for appointing of Watches in Cities and Towns Corporate, and for other Purposes.

An Act for amending an Act passed in the third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for confirming the Titles and for quieting the Possessions of Protestants; and for giving Time to Converts from Popery to perform the Requisites of Conformity prescribed by the Laws against Popery.

An Act for amending and continuing an Act passed in the Ninth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for repairing the Road leading from the Town of Armagh in the County of Armagh, to the Town of Newry in the County of Down.

An Act for preventing Frauds in the Measurement of Lime.

An Act to prevent the Importation of Wines in Casks, under the Size of thirty-one Gallons, except as herein excepted.

An Act for altering, amending, and making more effectual the Laws for repairing the Road leading from the City of Dublin to the Town of Kinnegad, in the County of Westmeath, and from thence to the Town of Mullingar in the same County; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for settling and preserving a Public Library in the City of Armagh for ever, and for enabling the Archbishop of Armagh to appropriate Parts of a Piece of Waste Ground contiguous to the said City, to certain Uses, for the Benefit of the Inhabitants thereof; and to make long Leases of the Remainder.

An Act to enable His Majesty's Subjects, of whatever Persuasion, to testify their Allegiance to Him.

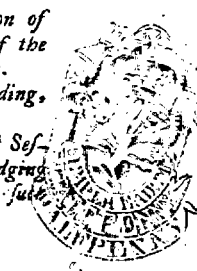
An Act for reviving and continuing several temporary Statutes, and to prevent the destructive Practice of Trawling for Fish in the Bay of Dublin.

An Act for explaining and amending an Act passed in the Fifth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for erecting and establishing Public Infirmaries or Hospitals in this Kingdom.

An Act to amend an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the Relief of the Insolvent Debtors named in the annexed Schedules.

An Act to prevent malicious Cutting and Wounding, and to punish Offenders called Chalkers.

An Act for amending an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for Badging



such Poor as shall be found unable to support themselves by Labour, and otherwise providing for them, and for restraining such as shall be found able to support themselves by Labour and Industry from Begging. An Act for the better Regulation of the Baking-Trade in the City of Dublin. And to Six Private Bills.

And then his Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, which is as follows:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE great and uncommon Variety of Publick Business, in which you have been engaged, and your constant Attention to the Performance of your Duty, must make you wish for the Conclusion of a Session, in which the many difficult and important Subjects under your Consideration could only have been relieved by that singular good Temper and Wisdom in your Deliberations, which have thrown a peculiar Lustre upon all your Proceedings, and crown your Labours for your Country with merited Success.

I reflect, with the greatest Satisfaction, that the many Difficulties and Embarrassments, which appeared at our first Meeting, have been surmounted and removed so ably and effectually, as to answer my warmest Wishes, and to exceed my most sanguine Expectations.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have His Majesty's express Commands to thank you, in His Name, for the extraordinary and seasonable Supplies, which you have granted, and which His Majesty justly considers as a conspicuous Instance of your Attachment to His Royal Person and Government; and I am to assure you, that they are as graciously and favourably accepted, as they have been liberally and cheerfully given. It is a striking Proof of your Wisdom and Sagacity, that the Means which you have used for raising the Supplies have not only supported His Majesty's Government, but have, at the same Time, raised and established Publick and Private Credit, and promoted the Commerce, Manufactures, and Industry, of the Kingdom.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I should have reviewed my Administration with little Satisfaction to myself, if, while so much had been done for the honourable Support of Government, no Acquisition had been obtained for this Country. But, among the many useful Laws, passed this Session of Parliament, the Act for granting an effectual Bounty on the Exportation of Corn affords the strongest Proof of the Paternal Attention of the most Beneficent Sovereign, to the Welfare and Prosperity of His dutiful and affectionate Subjects of this Kingdom; and has formed the most compleat System of Laws, for the Encouragement of Tillage, that exists in any Country. This reciprocal Intercourse of Duty and Protection, which has for so many Years happily prevailed, and from which so many salutary Consequences have been derived, during His Majesty's auspicious Reign, holds out, to every Part of His Majesty's Empire, an Example reflecting the highest Honour upon the Virtues of a most amiable and excellent Sovereign, and the Wisdom and good Conduct of affectionate and loyal Subjects.

In the high Station, in which His Majesty has placed me, I claim no Merit, but a faithful Execution of His Majesty's gracious Purposes, for the Happiness of His People of Ireland, and the most just, and therefore the most favourable Representations of their loyal, dutiful, and affectionate Conduct, which cannot fail to intitle them to the Continuance of His Royal Favour and Protection.

Your favourable Acceptance of my Endeavours to do my Duty, and your kind Approbation of my Conduct, expressed in Terms so very distinguished and honourable to me, demand my warmest Acknowledgments. I have sincerely wished to deserve your good Opinion; it is my earnest Desire to cultivate and improve it; and my unal-

terable Resolution to exert my most strenuous Efforts, at all Times, and upon all Occasions, to promote the Happiness and Prosperity of Ireland.

After which the Lord Chancellor, by his Excellency's Command, said:

My Lords and Gentlemen,
