O*Stockholm, June 7.* N the 4th Instant his Swedish Majesty went to Upsal to be present at the Exercise of the Regiment of Cairassiers in the Plains near that City. After dining on the 5th with his Royal Highness Prince Charles, at his Seat at Roserberg, his Majesty returned to the Camp in the Park near Stockholm, which consists of about Three Thousand Men; and Yesterday there was a great Appearance of the Foreign Ministers and Nobility of both Sexes in his Majesty's Tent, it being his Name-Day.

either of the said Felonies, doth hereby promise His most gracious Pardon to any one who shall make Discovery of his, her, or their, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Felonies, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
