*St. James's, August 3.*

**T**HIS Day His Majesty was pleased to fill up the two vacant Stalls of the most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

The Dean of the Order and Major-General Sir William Draper, Knight of the Bath, attending, habited in their Mantles, proceeded into the Sovereign's Presence in the following Order, viz.

The Gentleman-Usher Daily Waiter carrying the Sword of State.

The Deputy Gentleman Usher of the Order, in his Mantle, bearing the Scarlet Rod.

The Deputy Bath King of Arms, bearing the Ribbon and Badge, on a Velvet Cushion.

Then, in Obedience to the Sovereign's Command, Lieutenant-General George Howard was introduced into the Presence between Sir William Draper and the Dean of the Order, and, kneeling before the Sovereign, received the Honour of Knighthood; after which Sir William Draper presented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereign, and His Majesty put them over the new-made Knight's Right Shoulder, who, being thus invested, and having kissed His Majesty's Hand, retired.

Afterwards Sir William Draper and the Dean of the Order introduced the Right Honourable John Blaquiere in the same Manner, who having received the Honour of Knighthood from the Sovereign, was by him also invested with the Ribbon of the Order as before.

The Ceremony was performed in His Majesty's Closet after the Levee, several Great Officers of the Court being present.

*Petersburg, July 12.*

The last Advices from Marshal Romanzow brought an Account of the Operations of the Russian Army. Soon after the Passage of the Danube the Corps under the Generals Kamenky and Suworow attacked the Body of Troops under the Command of the Reis Effendi, amounting to 40,000 Men, which having made no Manner of Resistance was instantly routed: The whole Turkish Camp was taken, together with 32 Pieces of Brass Cannon: Very few Men were killed on either Side. A separate Party of the Turks having attacked Count Soltikow, were vigorously repulsed, and 2500 Turks left dead in the Field. Her Imperial Majesty has made Marshal Romanzow a Present of Six Pieces of the Cannon which were taken from the Turks.

The Epidemical Distemper, which has prevailed for some Time in different Parts of this Country, seems at present to subside, and the Symptoms are no longer of so alarming a Nature, many Persons in the Houses where the Infection has appeared having escaped the Contagion; notwithstanding this, all proper Precautions still continue to be taken.

The Mortality among the Horses still prevails; from which, and from the uncommon Dryness of the Season, which it is feared will destroy the Corn in many Parts of this Empire, the common People may probably suffer much.

On Saturday last, being the Anniversary of her Imperial Majesty's Accession to the Throne, there was a brilliant Court at Peterhoff.

The same Day the Empress was pleased to bestow an Estate of 2000 Peasants on Count Osterman; and to restore the Countess his Mother to the Rank she enjoyed before the Exile of her Husband.

On Sunday, the Name-Day of her Imperial Highness, there was a magnificent Masquerade and Illumination at Peterhoff.

*Brussels, August 2.* The Harvest in this Country is far advanced, and it is expected will turn out very plentiful; so that the Liberty lately granted by the Government for the Exportation of Grain has given great Satisfaction to the Landlords and Farmers.

*Vienna, July 23.* Marshal Lascey is expected here in a few Days, in order to attend his Imperial Majesty to the Camps in Stiria and Hungary.

*Ostend, August 4.* The Markets here have been regularly supplied with Wheat, at a moderate Price, since the Order of the 21st of July, which has kept the People quiet; but at Newport, about Three Leagues from hence, a Disturbance happened last Saturday by the People's pillaging a Waggon laden with Wheat; and Yesterday the same Mob threatened to set Fire to a Vessel loading Wheat in the Harbour, unless the Corn was relanded, which was immediately complied with.

The present Price of Corn shipping here is at the Rate of about 42 sh. Sterling per English Quarter on board; but until Tranquility is restored at and about Newport, no Corn can be brought hither from the District of Furnes, a Mob having last Week stoppt a Boat

Boat with Corn between Furnes and Newport, paying for what they took out at the stated Market Price.

The Barley is got in; it is said to be indifferent, and the Crops small; owing to the Winter Waters having damaged the Seed.

The Canals between Ghent and Bruges, and between Bruhes and this Town, are to be drained quite dry on the 20th Instant, and to be kept so till the Middle of September, in order to deepen them, with a View to facilitate the more copious and speedy Discharge of the Winter Inundations from the Schelde and the Lys, with which these Provinces were extremely incommoded last Season.
