Petersburg, August 4.

LAST Night Marshal Romanzow's Son arrived at Peterhoff, with the agreeable News of the Peace having been signed on the 21st of July by Prince Repnin, (who had Powers from the Marshal for that Purpose) and two Turkish Plenipotentiaries named by the Grand Vizir: The principal Articles of which are — The Independency of the Crimea — The absolute Cession to Russia of Kinburn, Kerche, and Jenickale; and of all the District between the Bog and the Dnieper — A free Navigation in all the Turkish Seas; in which is included the Passage through the Dardanelles, with all the Privileges and Immunities which are granted to the most favoured Nations — Several Stipulations in favour of the Inhabitants of Moldavia and Wallachia, as well as those of the Islands restored by Russia to the Porte; the Detail of which the Marshal has not yet specified, reserving farther Particulars till he sends the Ratification, which he had stipulated with the Grand Vizir should be signed on or before the 26th of July, and which he means to transmit by Prince Repnin — Russia is to retain Azoff and Taganrok.

Vienna, August 10. His Imperial Majesty sets out this Evening for the Camp in Stiria, and intends to be on the 19th at the Camp at Pest. The Duke Albert of Saxony, and Marshal Lascey, will attend his Imperial Majesty to both the Camps. His Serene Highness Prince George of Mecklenbourg-Strelitz, who has been here some Days, will set out on the 15th for the last-mentioned Camp in Hungary.

Berlin, August 13. On Monday last her Serene Highness the Dutchess of Brunswick set out from his Royal Highness Prince Henry's Country Palace of Rhinsberg, on her Return Home.

His Prussian Majesty proposes to set out the Day after tomorrow for Silesia, to review his Troops in those Quarters, and will be accompanied by the Prince Royal, his Nephew.

St. James's, August 23.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Master Alder Cardonnel, George Clerk Maxwell, Basil Cuthbert, and Archibald Menzies, Esquires, together with Wilcam Nelthorpe, Esq; in the room of Joseph Tudor, Esq; deceased, to be His Majesty's Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of His Majesty's Customs and other Duties in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; and also for the Receipt and Management of the Duties on all Salt and Rock Salt imported, and upon Salt made there.

The King has been pleased, at the humble Petition of the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgeesses, of the Borough of Avingdon in the County of Berks, to grant unto them and their Successors, a Power to chuse every Year two Persons out of the Body of the Capital Burgeesses to execute the Offices of Justices of the Peace within the said Borough, and the Precincts and Liberties thereof, for one whole Year.
