Peterburg, August 30.
THE contagious Distemper amongst the Horses having ceased some Time ago, all further Precautions against its Spreading are become unnecessary.

Venice, September 9. In Consideration of the general Failure of the Crops in this State, the Senate has judged it expedient to open this Port for the free Importation of Foreign Corn, for the Term of Six Months.

Vienna, September 10. The Camp at Laxembourg will break up tomorrow, and his Imperial Majesty sets out immediately after for the Camp at Prague. Prince Charles of Saxony having expressed his Desire of being present at the Manoeuvres, in order to meet his Brother Prince Albert there, the Emperor has been pleased to grant his Request.

Berne, September 14. On Saturday last, the 10th Instant, about Four in the Afternoon, we had three Shocks of an Earthquake, which lasted about three Seconds. The Direction was from South to North. The first and third Shocks were but weak, but the Second was a violent one; the Buildings were greatly shaken; however there was no Damage done.

Dunkirk, September 20. Four Buoys have this Day been laid, by Order of the Board of Admiralty, to point out the West Passage into the Road of Dunkirk, viz. A Black Buoy on the East Side of the Bank called the Geere; Another Black One at the North Point of the Snauw or Splinter, a small Bank due North of Old Mardick; A White Buoy at the West End of the Brack-bank; And a Black One on the most advanced Part of the Coast, opposite the Channel of Mardick: Vessels coming into the Road are to keep the Three Black Buoys to the Right, and the White One to the Left. The said Buoys are laid in Five Fathom Water.

St. James's, September 22.
 This Day being the Anniversary of Their Majesty's Coronation, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on the Occasion. The Park and Tower Guns were fired at Noon; and in the Evening there were Illuminations, and all Public Demonstrations of Joy.

 The King has been pleased to grant unto Mary Mansergh, of Macrony in the County of Corke in the Kingdom of Ireland, Widow, His Royal Leave and Authority to take and use the Name of St. George in Addition to her Name of Mansergh; and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.
