We are told they have a delign to for ifie Wilfenifen, where they have sheady fent fome of their Artillety with great flore of Arms, and some Loads of Tools for b caking up the earth, and have put in 300 f.esh Soldiers to reinforce that Gurifor, which gives much jealcusies to the Neighboring Countreys, and particularly to the Bishop of Munster, who has put his forces into a posture to march, and commanded all his Subjects ther are able to bear Arms, to be ready whenlos ver they shall be commanded to march to the Frontiers, if eccasion require it to defend thei Countrey

The fourteenth of this moneth, a conference is to be held at Hildesteim, in order to the composure of the diff rences between the Elector of Cologne, and the Duke of Brunfwick which has been forme ly much end avored by the Bifhop of Stratsbourg, but without the iffue which he hoped for.
