Edenburgh, Decemb. 17.

Yesterday according to the sentence on Wednesday last pronounced by the Justice, Mr. Alexander Robertson Minister, Captain Neilson of Corsock, George Crawford, and John Gordon, were hanged at the Market Cross of this City, and their heads cut off, which are ordered to be set up in the most publick places of this Town, the cutting off their Armes being remitted by the Council: The Lord Commissioner is still at Glasgow, with the Lord Chief Justice of Scotland, and 'tis believed will shortly shew some exemplary justice upon some of the Rebels there.

Chester, Decemb. 19. Yesterday in obedience to his Majesty's commands, Sir Jeffery Shakerley our Governour, with the Officers and Soldiers of this Garrison, took the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Norwich, Decemb. 19. Our Bill of Mortality for this last week runs thus, buried of all Diseases 17. Whereof of the Plague 14.

Portsmouth, Decemb. 20. This week according to his Majesty's late Proclamation, the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, were tendered, and taken by all the Officers and Soldiers of this Garrison.

Rome, Novemb. 27. On Thursday last his Holiness returned to this City, to the great content and satisfaction of all men, but especially those, who by reason of his absence, received obstruction in their affairs, depending upon the Court, but the ill temper of the weather not agreeing with his constitution, has for the present confined him to his former retirement, he as much dreading the coldness of Winter as the heats of Summer.

Notwithstanding the reports blown about this Court, the Archbishoprick of Naples continues still vacant; nor is it yet resolved to whose share it shall fall, that preferment not being like to want powerful competitors, since every day more discovers the high value of that See, by the great wealth the deceased Cardinal Filomarini left behind him, amounting to at the least 500000 Crowns in ready money, and above 200000 pounds in Goods. The Popes Bull has hitherto wrought no effects at Naples, where they continue firm and unmoveable in their resolution, not to part with the Administration of their Archbishoprick, during the vacancy.

The Marquis de Sorbello, with his son, being accused of several great crimes, continue prisoners in the Castle St. Angelo; and, as some believe, with the Emperors leave, which it is true, one or both of them will be severely proceeded against, though the Father, to save his Son, takes all the crimes upon himself.

The Duke of Longueville, who at his leaving France, brought with him in his company four or five of his Commanders, pretending an intention to stay in the Wars against the Turks in Dalmatia, has often in appearance shewed that design, and been seen a good in Polish habit, observing some Italian Customs to turn Comedian, though unwilling to leave his estate to his Brother. He has not long conversed with the General of the Janissaries, but has promised to continue amongst them: He is since returned to Naples in disguise.

His Holiness's real business, being obliged to take care of his health, has much disturbed several of the Grandees, especially the French Ambassador, who seems very impatient of delays, but to divert himself spends much of his time in viewing the Antiquities of the City. Pedro Olivera, General of the Order of the Jesuits, has pleaded in their chief Church here, to inveigh much against those Princes, who for their ease and pleasure, neglected the publick interest, so much to

the scandal of their adversaries, which is ill resented at the Court.

'Tis also used, that the Cardinal Rospiogliosi is speedily to be removed from his charge of Secretary of State, and the Cardinal Litta stands fair to succeed him in that employment.

Elfenor, Novemb. 27. The Danes Admiral Helt having lost his ship of 60 guns, was in the breaking of it upon the Rocks much bruised and hurt in the Leg, of which he lies very ill in Norway, besides his ship and the St. Michael, which was lost on the coast of Scotland; two others of our Men of War are still wanting, which we suppose have had the same fate: be cast away; which has much changed the countenance of his people, and 'tis said, those ships that are abroad shall be speedily called home.

Dantzick, Decemb. 4. The Det continues at Warsaw as it began, with great probability of confirming and setting that Kingdom in a firm and durable peace: The Frosts begin here to shut up the Havens of this Country. Several Vessels that are ready to sail, are in some danger of being frozen in for this Winter; but many hands are at work to break the Ice to make them pass.

Venice, Decemb. 6. The tempestuous weather, and contrary winds we have had of late, hinders us from receiving any advice from the Armata, or setting out the Fleet as we intended with supplies for it: we hear of many wrecks upon the coasts, especially about Istria, which puts us into much fear, for the Convoys set out some time since, which was obliged to put in about those parts.

Signior Morisini with his Squadron, waits only a fair wind to set sail for the Armata, where he is to command as Provisioner General, and carries with him great store of Money, Munition, and Ammunition, for the service of the Fleet, and the reinforcement of our Garrisons in Candia.

From Dalmatia we are informed, that all things are at the present in a quiet posture in those parts, and the Seas but little infested by the Pyrates, only one of them belonging to Cassel Novo, having been discovered by our Vessels, was accordingly attacked by them, but being a nimble Vessel, with some difficulty got away, but carried with him the marks of his adventure, several of his Men being killed, and many wounded.

The last letters we had from Constantinople advise us, that the grand Signior is wholly bent upon the War with this Republick, and is making great preparations of all sorts of Provisions necessary for Sea and land service, intending the next spring to prosecute his design upon Candia with greater vigor than formerly, to which purpose great and insupportable Subsidies and Taxes are imposed upon the people throughout his Dominions, his Subjects generally unable, and consequently refusing to pay more than the Moyety of what they are charged with, but the Christians being more apprehensive of a severe usage, force themselves to supply the whole, though to their great impoverishment. From Morocco we are informed, that Signior Patavino, Secretary to the late Ambassador the Chancellor Bellarino, has taken care for the Honorable entertainment of that great Minister, and is gone forward towards Salenicho, to attend the grand Visier: the Senate here upon consultation have made choice of the Secretary Glavarinia to supply the room of the deceased Ambassador to the Ottoman Court. We are likewise told from Malta, that three Gallies belonging to the Det, have in their cruising met with five Corsayres belonging to Algiers, with whom they had a sharp, but a successful engagement,

having after some hours fight, sunk two of them, and took two, the fifth saving her self by flight, the night coming on, which favored her escape. The two prizes were brought safe into that Island with 400 *Turks* prisoners, and 160 *Christian Slaves*, who were immediately set at liberty.

From *Constantinople* we are also told, that the City has suffered much by a sudden and great inundation, which has ruined many houses, and drowned a great number of people.

Genoa, Decemb. 7. The differences between this Republic and the *Milanois*, about the Waters of the River of *Escurvia*, are like to be amicably composed, the Government being sufficiently satisfied, that the violence offered by our Soldiers were against the Order of the Senate.

The *Marquis de Bayonne* having complained, that the Fort of *Savona* made several shots against his Gallies as he passed by; the Governor of *Milan*, the Cardinal *Sforza*, and the Vice-Roy of *Naples*, seem to blame his near approaches to the Fort, since he had no intention to take it.

Letters are sent to *Spain* with the account of this business, which (it is believed) will be determined there according to the judgment of these three great Ministers.

Our late Letters from *Milan* inform us, that the *Soldiers* levied in that Dutchy for the service of his Catholick Majesty, are to march to the Sea side, under the command of the Sergeant Major *Don Francesco Ravizza*. They discourse there of new levies both of Horse and Foot. The Governor *Don Luis Ponz de Leon* being also very diligent in visiting all places of that Dutchy, and furnishing his Garrisons with Ammunition and Provision.

Hamburg, Decemb. 10. The *Swedes* forces keep still together, nor is it yet known what intention they have, nor where they will dispose of themselves this Winter. We are told they have a design to fortify *Hilffuisen*, where they have already sent some of their Artillery with great store of Arms, and some Loads of Tools for breaking up the earth, and have put in 300 fresh Soldiers to reinforce that Garrison, which gives much jealousies to the Neighboring Countreys, and particularly to the Bishop of *Munster*, who has put his forces into a posture to march, and commanded all his Subjects that are able to bear Arms, to be ready whensoever they shall be commanded to march to the Frontiers, if occasion require it to defend their Countrey.

The fourteenth of this month, a conference is to be held at *Hillesheim*, in order to the composition of the differences between the Elector of *Cologne*, and the Duke of *Brunswick*, which has been formerly much endeavored by the Bishop of *Strasbourg*, but without the issue which he hoped for.

Paris, Decemb. 22. The Admiral hath lately dispatched a Courier to *Rochele*, with order not to put to Sea those 12 ships that were designed and fitted up to cruise upon our coasts as our Winter guard, but to detain them, and expect his farther commands.

Monsieur de Vertamont has his liberty restored to him, and is gone from the *Bastille* where he was prisoner, by virtue of the sentence pronounced against him; but the Masters of Requests are ill satisfied with the form of their procedures against him; and have made their complaints against the Judgment given, affirming it to be against the usual practice of things of this nature, the Judges not having been informed of the business as they ought to have been: They have also demanded, that the Execution of the Arrest may be suspended, and the business heard by the Parliament. However, *Monsieur Puffort* is sent to *Monsieur de Vertamonts* House, to take an account of his Papers, and to make a strict enquiry after those persons that are suspected to have contributed towards the composition of the Faction against the Archbishop.

The Legate of *Avignon* taking notice of several persons that have and still do repair to the City for shelter, against the severe proceedings of the Council *des Grands jours*, has lately published his Declaration, importing, That the City of *Avignon* cannot be a place of security to them, having lost its ancient Privileges, and consequently will be obliged to deliver them up to the King of *France*, whensoever he shall demand them as criminals.

Monsieur de Mondargue sent Vice-Roy to *Madagascar*, is reported to have died there presently after his arrival.

It is also said, that the Count *de Montgomery* is to be recalled from the *Bastille*, and upon the frequent visits made to him by *Pescanus*, several persons have taken occasion to collect his hastie thoughts of changing his Religion. 'Tis likewise discoursed, that his Majesty has given order upon the Frontiers of *Picardy, Champagne, and Lorraine*, that the Smiths be every where set to work; that great quantities of Spades, Pickaxes, and all such like Tools be speedily provided, that shall be thought necessary for breaking of Ground, and raising Works.

The Parliament has verified his Majesties late Declaration, prohibiting all sorts of persons from wearing Arms after seven of the clock in the Evenings, during the Winter; and commanding, that no persons for the future presume to wear Swords but only Gentlemen, and such Officers as belong to his Majesty; with several other clauses for the suppression of Gaming-houses, and other inconveniences and abuses too frequently practised in this City, commanding the Archers to march frequently every day through the Streets, for the security of all places, and to seize upon the Swords of all such persons that presume to wear them against the intention of this Declaration.

Middleburgh, Decemb. 25. The States of *Holland* continue still to sit at *Ambray*, and proceed in their diligent and frequent consultations with the *Dputies* from the several Admiralties, for the setting out the Fleet against the next Summer; being informed, that several *Fleemings* and *Swedes* were fraught and laden with *Powder* in *Holland* and *Zeland*, they have prohibited their transportation under great penalties.

The tenth instant, several of their Members were sent to the *Texels*, to visit the Vessels that were to sail from thence into *England* with exchanged prisoners, having had information that some counterfeit Goods were privately embarked to the disservice, and contrary to the Order of the State.

The *Bay* of *Bremen* on Thursday last, was admitted into the presence of the Assembly of the States General, to take his leave of them, and return thanks for the care they took for them, and affection shewed to their City in their late differences with *Sweden*. The States have also given order to their *Dputies* at *Bremen* to hasten their return; and 'tis believed, they intend speedily to disband a great part of the forces raised upon that occasion; but, that a great part of them shall be dispersed amongst their old companies, which are to be kept always complete and full.

From *Amsterdam* we are informed, That two of the ships that intended for *Guiny*, and were by violence or storm forced ashore, have received much damage, and were in great danger of being cast away; but they have now some hopes by lighting the Vessels, to put them again on flar.

From *Rotterdam*, we are advised of the arrival of a Vessel laden with *Wines* from *Pourdeaux*, having by the way lost the company of 13 other Vessels with the same lading, that came out from thence with her; but meeting with a storm off of *Conquet*, they were all of them dispersed, and as yet no advice arrived of any of them.

The Admiralty of *Amsterdam* talk big of their preparations for the next Spring, and have already fixt upon 36 persons, whom they design for Captains in the next years service.

Deal, Decemb. 19. Upon information brought to the Isle of *Thanet*, of three ships cast away upon *Godwin Sands*, some Boats were sent out to attend them, who found a French Man of War, and two Merchants ships there cast away, and not one man lived: Much of their Goods with some Timber was driven on shore in that Isle, and above 60 Straw-beds and some broken pieces of the shipping driven hither.
