Leopol, Octob. 30.

THose that come from the Kings Camp, speak with admiration of what they have seen there, they tell us, That the King had not with him above 15000 men, to oppose an Army of 200000, who had beset his Camp on all sides, and made their Approaches to it in the same manner as they would have done to a place besieged; That the Turks had advanced very considerably, and had raised a Battery near the Polish Camp of that height that the Poles lay altogether open to their Cannon, and besides, begun to be in very great want of Provisions when the Peace was concluded, and redeemed them almost from an inevitable ruine, after which the Turks and Tartars immediately decamped and retired, leaving to the wonder of all people two great pieces of Cannon, with a very great quantity of Ammunition behind them in their Camp, which we suppose they did by way of ostentation to shew the abundance they had, or else through want of Carriages. We expect his Majesty here in two or three days, and a triumphal Arch is preparing here, which he is to pass when he enters this City.

Vicenna, Nov. 15. His Imperial Majesty will certainly part hence the 23 instant, on his way to *Lintz*, where he purposes to arrive the 28. th, and on the 5. th of *December* at *Passaw*; the 12. th his Imperial Majesty will make a visit to his Bride, at a place called *Newbourg*, not far from *Passaw*, where the marriage will be celebrated the next day. Here is arrived within these two or three days a Turkish Chiaus with a Train of about 17 persons; he has not yet had any Audience, but we are told that his business is to assure this Court of the constant resolution of the Grand Signior to maintain the peace and good correspondence which is at present subsisting between him and his Imperial Majesty.

Copenhagen, Nov. 17. In *Schonen* the Affairs stand in the same posture I advised in my last, and what was said of the two Kings having had a Conference together proves a mistake, occasioned by the meeting of two parties, with which both Kings were for it happened that their Majesties were abroad at the same time, each with a Body of Horse, to discover the posture of his Enemies; they parted not without some skirmish, in which the Danes pretend to have had the advantage, and that of the Suedes side several Persons of Quality were killed, and others taken Prisoners. We are likewise told that upon the Suedes retreat from *Helsingburg* the Governor of the Castle sallied out upon them, and killed and took Prisoners about 300 of them.

Ditto, Nov. 24. Our last advices from *Schonen* tell us, that the 18 instant at night the Suedish Army decamped, and marched with great speed, putting their Infantry behind their Cavalry, and in Waggon, with intention to have got between the Danish Army and *Malmoe* in order to the relieving it, but that the King of *Denmark* having timely notice of the Enemies design prevented it, marching with his Army nearer to *Malmoe*, and encamping within half a League of the

place, where he continues, not being above a League from the Enemies Camp. We are told that the Danes begin to be very impatient of the cold and rigors of the season, and therefore are desirous to come to a decisive action, which, it's believed, the Suedes will avoid, for that they can better endure the ships, and intend to make a Winter War. Yesterday arrived here the Danish Men of War that had been before *Gottenburg*, and in them the *Sieur Guldenlied* Viceroy of *Noway* who immediately passed over into *Schonen*, to attend the King. The Duke of *Holstein Ploen* is likewise arrived here in his return to the Army.

Hamburg, Nov. 27 On Monday last the Duke of *Zell* arrived at *Zell*, the place of his ordinary residence, having left his troops ready to go into their Winter quarters. In *Pomerania* the Campagne is likewise at an end, and the Elector of *Brandenburg* is returned to *Berlin*. The Imperial Troops which have served as Auxiliaries to the said Elector this summer are marching towards *Silesia*, and, it's said, that they are to be employed in *Hungary*, where the Rebels grow very considerable. We had several reports here concerning a Conference between the two Kings in *chonen*, and an Engagement afterwards between the two Armies, but the last Letter from *Copenhagen* which are of the 24 instant contradict them, and only say, that the Armies had changed their quarters, and that at the King of *Denmark* was encamped about a League from *Malmoe*, upon a vice that the Suedes had a design to make a farther attempt to relieve that place, and that in order thereunto, the whole Suedish Army was to march that way. The said Swedish Army when these Letters came away lay half a League from *Landskroone*, being about a League from the Danes, who, it's said, desire to come to an action, which may determine the Campagne, rather than be obliged to continue in the Field in this Season.

Brisac, Nov. 19. The Imperialists having quitted the Territories of the Suisse Cantons, they encamped the 15 instant between *Fribourg* and *Offenbourg*. The same day the Duke of *Luxemburg* marched with his whole Army towards *Mombeliard*, having the day before sent the Count of *Maulevrier Colbers*, Lieutenant-General with a detachment of 3000, to oblige the Inhabitants of that place to receive a French Garrison. The 16, four pieces of Cannon of 24 l. each, with two Mortar-pieces, and several Waggon's laden with Ammunition were sent from hence, likewise towards *Mombeliard*, from whence we hear the Prince is retired to *Basle*.

Strasburg, Nov. 26. The Imperial Troops are marching in three Bodies to their Winter quarters, for which they the more hasten, for that their Country is already in a very ill condition. The French Army is likewise marched, in order to their going into Winter quarters; and yesterday we had advice that the Duke of *Luxemburg* had put a Garrison into *Mombeliard*, Several French Regiments are come to *Saverne*, with orders to go and join the *Marschal de Crequi*, but the

Campagne being likewise ended on that side, it's believ'd they will not proceed.

Colozac, Nov. 20. The Bishop of *Osna-brug* has been for some days incognito here, while his chief Minister is adjusting the Winter quarters for his Troops in this Diocess; but we are told, that the Ministers of the Duke of *Newburg* residing at *Dusfeldorp*, have absolutely refused to grant them any quarters in the Territories of the Duke their Master. It is said that a party of the said Troops have had an Encounter with a like party of the French in the Countrey of *Eyffelt*, and that the latter were routed, and many taken prisoners. The French parties make frequent incursions into this Diocess, having lately pillaged the Village of *Roth* within half a League of this place. By our last Letters from *Alsace* we understand, that both Armies are sent into their Winter quarters, that of the Emperor into *Suabia, Thuringia* and *Franconia*, and the French put their Infantry into the Towns of the *Upper Alsace*, and their horse marches to *Lorrain* and *Burgundy*.
Dusseldorf, Nov. 27. From *Lippstadt* they write, that six Regiments of the Elector of *Brandenburg* were on their march from *Pomeran* to take their Winter-quarters in those parts. From *Trier* our Letters advise, that the 21 instant the Confederate Troops commanded by the Duke of *Zell* repass'd the *Rhine* near *Mentz*; and from *Alsace* we are told, that the French have made themselves Masters of *Mombeliard*. Monsieur *Plat* the Bishop of *Osna-brug's* Minister hath very much press'd our Elector to grant the Duke his Master a nother Town in this Diocess, besides *Weventlingham*, where he has at present his Head-quarters, but his Electoral Highness cannot be disposed thereunto; and, it's said, that those Troops will endeavor to possess themselves of it by force. We have Letters from *Offenburg* of the 22d, which say, that 16 Regiments of the Imperial Army were arriv'd near that place, of which 11 Regiments took their march towards *Hailbron*, to pass the *Neckar* there, and so to enter into *Franconia* and the other five towards *Philipsburg*. This evening we expect the Count *Kins* of the Imperial Plenipotentiary will arrive here from *Francfurt*, on his way to *Nimwegen*, whither he goes to assist at the Treaty of Peace which will be suddenly begun there.

Basel, Nov. 21. Yesterday arriv'd here the Duke of *Mombeliard*, with his Dutchesse and Family, the French having put a Garrison into the place of his ordinary Residence. The Forces which the Suisse Cantons had brought together to guard several Passes to hinder the Imperialists passing through their Territories, are now ordered to return to their several quarters.

Heydelberg, Nov. 2. At *Hailbron* are expected 11 Imperial Regiments, who are to pass the *Neckar* there, and are to go and winter in *Franconia*. The *Munster* and *Lunenburg* Troops pretend to have Winter-quarters at *Creusnach*, &c. The Garrison in *Deuxponts* is at present 1800 strong, and at *Diedershoven* the French have posted 3000 men. In this the Countrey on the other side the *Rhine* will be very subject this winter to the excursions of those Garrisons, notwithstanding *Philipsburg* is in the hand of the Imperialists. The detachment commanded by Major General *Dunewald* marches towards *Spire*, to pass the *Rhine* there.

Hague, Decemb. 1. The 26 past his Highness accompanied with the Council of State in Body went to the Assembly of the States of *Holland*, to propose to them the state of the War for the year ensuing, which is now under debate. The 28 his Highness parted hence for *Zeland*, to be present there at the opening the Assembly of the States of that Province. We hear that the French Capers have taken one or two of our Ships coming from *Moskov*.

Brussels, Decemb. 1. The Treaty which hath been on foot

between us and the French, for the settling the Contributions to be paid by the people on both sides, is now quite broken off, to the great trouble of these Inhabitants, who had hoped by such settlement to have been somewhat more at ease than they are at present. From *Cambrai* they write, that a considerable Body of French Cavalry is quartered in that Neighborhood, in such manner as that upon a Signal given by those that lie nearest to *Cambrai*, they can in few hours be drawn together; which they do to prevent the excursion of the Garrison of *Cambrai*. The States of these Provinces have granted his Excellency, for the defraying the expences of the next year 1800 Rations per day, which amounts in the whole to about 150000 *l. sterl.* This money, together with what we rec'd from *Spain*, will we hope put us in a pretty good posture against Spring. We are much dissatisfied here at the retreat of the Confederate Troops, under the command of the Duke of *Zell*, from whom we had expected such great matters. Our Letters from *Italy* bring us the ill news of the French having taken the *Scalasia*.

Paris, Decemb. 2. The Duke of *Luxemburg* and the *Mareschal Crequi* are expected at Court in few days, the Enemy being retired, and gone into their Winter-quarters. *Mombeliard* is now in the hands of the French, the place having received a Garrison the 19 instant. Our Letters from *Sieily* give us an account that the Duke de *Vroumme* has taken the *Scalasia*, a place of great importance.
