AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 28th Day of *October*, 1774,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 5th of *October*, 1770, to direct, That no Horned Cattle, nor any Manner of Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs, or other Part of any Horned Cattle or Beast, nor any Hay, Straw, Litter, Fodder, or other Things which have been employed about infected Cattle, or the Hides or any other Part of such Cattle, or have been in or near the Places where any such Infection hath been, and are liable to retain the same, should be imported from any Ports or other Places on the Coast of France, within the Districts of *Picardie*, *Normandie*, and *Bretagne*, into the Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Islands or Dominions thereto belonging; — And whereas Information hath been received, that an epidemical Distemper has broke out amongst the Horned Cattle in the Neighbourhood of *Bordeaux*: His Majesty doth therefore judge it proper to extend the afore-mentioned Prohibition, and accordingly doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order and Command, That no Horned Cattle, nor any Manner of Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs, or other Part of any Horned Cattle or Beast, nor any Hay, Straw, Litter, Fodder, or other Things which have been employed about infected Cattle, or the Hides or any other Part of such Cattle, or have been in or near the Places where any such Infection hath been, and are liable to retain the same, shall from henceforth be imported from any Ports or other Places on the Coast of France, within the Districts afore-mentioned, or from any Ports or other Places within the Districts of *Poitou*, *Guienne* and *Gascogne*, into the Kingdom of Great Britain, or Ireland, or any of the Islands or Dominions thereto belonging; — And His Majesty doth further, with the Advice of His Privy Council, strictly Charge and Command all Magistrates, Constables, Officers of the Customs and Excise, to stop, seize, and destroy, the several Things so prohibited as aforesaid, using and exercising in that Behalf the like Authority as any Officer or Officers have by any Law now in being, in Cases of prohibited and uncustomed Goods. — And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

**W**HEREAS an Act of Parliament was passed in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, "An Act to im-  
power His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for im-  
powering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and  
Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty

to restrain the Carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:" And His Majesty, judging it necessary to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, out of this Kingdom, or carrying the same Coastwise, for some Time, doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit, and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of this Order in Council, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by the aforementioned Act. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein; as to them may respectively appertain.

*Petersburg*, *October* 7. The Rebellion is now at End, and the Tranquility of this Empire restored, by the taking of the Rebel Pugatcheff, who has been so long the Disturber of it. The Empress received this agreeable and important News by a Courier who arrived this Morning from General Panin, with an Account that the abovementioned Traitor had been bound Hand and Foot by some of the Cossacks of the Yaick, who were his Adherents: these People informing General Panin of their having secured him, and of their Readiness to submit, the General immediately sent Prince Galitzin to seize Pugatcheff, The People in the revolted Provinces have since, upon General Panin's Arrival among them, returned to their Duty. The General is at present at a Town called *ensa*, the first that declared in Favour of Pugatcheff, the Inhabitants of which have submitted and obtained Pardon, except fifteen of the most culpable, who were hanged.

*Copenhagen*, *October* 21. This Evening the Marriage of his Royal Highness Prince Frederick, with the Princess Sophia Frederica of Mecklenbourg-Schwerin, was celebrated in the Chapel of the Palace of Christianibourg.
