

afternoon the said Duke parted hence; on his way to *Passau*. To morrow the Imperial Bride, the Princess of *Neuburg*, begins her journey from *Neuburg* to *Passau*, which she will take through the Territories of the Elector of *Bavaria*, who has given orders to several persons of quality of his Court to attend her Imperial Majesty, and to defray all the expences of her Court while in his Territories.

Cologne, Decemb. 1. On Saturday last arrived here the Count of *Kinsky*, Ambassador and Plenipotentiary of the Emperor for the Treaty of a general Peace; his Excellency means to continue some days here, and then will pass on his journey to *Nimeguen*. This morning the Bishop of *Osnabrug* is parted from *Wevelingboves*, where he hath for some time had his quarters in this Diocese, on his return to *Osnabrug*, leaving the command of his Troops to Major-General *Hefelen*; in the absence of Monsieur *Louigny*, who is at present at *Coblentz*, to confer with the Elector of *Trier*, as is said, about matters relating to the next Campaign. Three Regiments of the Duke of *Neubourg* have passed the *Rhine* at *Bonne* in order to their going into their Winter-quarters in the Countrey of *Berg*. The Sieur *Judoci* the Imperial Commissary hath had several Conferences with the Deputies of our Elector to regulate the Winter-quarters for the *Osnabrug* Troops, of whom the poor Countrey people in the mean time make great complaints. From *Neubourg*, where the Duke of that name hath for some time had his residence, they write, That the Prince of *Dietrichstein* the Emperors Ambassador was arrived there, and that on the 25th past the Imperial Bride was for the first time treated with the stile of Majesty; and on the 27th following was to part thence, accompanied by her Father and Mother, on her journey to *Passau*; on which occasion the Duke of *Neubourg* would meet and confer with the Elector of *Bavaria* at *Straubingen*.

Hague, Decemb. 1. The States of *Holland* have adjourned their Assembly for some days, and in the mean time the Deputies are gone home to consult their principles concerning the State of the War for the year ensuing, which is now under debate. His Highness is expected here from *Zealand* in ten or twelve days, by which time his Highness will without doubt have determined the affair he is gone about. Our Letters from *Hamburg* and those parts say, that the Swedes will endeavor to free *Stein* from the Blockade it is at present press'd with, and that in order thereunto Count *Coringmark*, intended to march with all his Cavalry from *Straelzons*, and besides to make an incursion into *Mecklenburg*.

Brussels, Decemb. 4. We are here in some impatience till the Spanish Courier arrive, which we expect will bring Bills of Exchange for a considerable Sum of Money, and consequently enable us to go on with the intended preparations of the next Campaign, as well as to satisfy the importunities of our Allies, who sollicite by their Ministers here the payment of Moneys due to them, for arrears of the Subsidies stipulated by Treaty. To this purpose the Bishop of *Osnabrug* has an Agent here, who we are told has a promise of 100000 Crowns to be paid him so soon as the said Moneys arrive from *Spain*, that so that Duke may begin his Recruits against Spring. The Treaty for the sending of Contributions is now quite broke off, to the great grief of the poor people, who suffer extremely in the War. Don *Pedro de Ronquillo* one of the Ambassadors and Plenipotentiaries of *Spain* parted hence on Wednesday last, on his way to *Nimeguen*, though we are told he intended to make some stay at *Austrerp*. The Count de *Kinsky*,

the Imperial Plenipotentiary is likewise arrived at *Cologne*, so that we hope to hear that the Ambassadors of all the principal Parties at least, are arrived at *Nimeguen* yet before *Christmas*. The Armies being every where gone into Winter-quarters, we cannot expect any great matters from abroad. That the French have possessed themselves of *Mombelliard*, and that the Prince of that name is retired with his Family to *Basle* comes confirmed, which is a thing of importance to the French, who have thereby rendered themselves Masters of the passage into *Burgundy* on that side. The 26th past the Duke of *Lorraine* arrived at *Efelingen* in *Suabia*, where he will have his Head-quarter this winter.

Paris, Decemb. 5. The Major of the Kings Gallies is arrived here, being dispatched by the Duke de *Guynes* to give his Majesty an account of his late successes in *Italy*, viz. of his having taken *Tavormina*, the *Scaloria* and several other considerable Ports, by means whereof the Countrey for 70 miles in length lies open to the Messines, to supply themselves with Provisions and other necessaries from thence. The Duke of *Luxemburg* and most of the General Officers are returned to Court from *Germany*, the Armies being gone into their Winter-quarters. From *France* they write, that the Imperial Ministers did very much press the Elector of *Mentz* to receive Garisons as well into that his capital City as into *Wormes*, because of the difficulty they were in to furnish Winter-quarters for the Confederate Troops, lately commanded by the Duke of *Zell*, and the rather for that their measures have been wholly broken by the unexpected retreat of the said Troops from before *Dierpoms*, which they had promised themselves they would not only have made themselves Masters of, but likewise have got Winter-quarters in the French Territories. The Marechal *Craqui* is in few days likewise expected at Court, seeing there is no likelihood of any farther action this year.
