Stockholm, November 22.

**Y**ESTERDAY his Swedish Majesty held a Chapter of his Orders; when the two Senators, Baron Ribbing, and General Sinclair Governor of Pomerania, were decorated with the Order of Seraphim.

Prince Fredericks having been taken suddenly ill at his Country-Seat, the Queen Dowager set out at Midnight to visit his Royal Highness, who is so much recovered, that it is expected he may be removed hither tomorrow.

Copenhagen, November 29. Representations having been made of the Danger to which Ships navigating the Baltick are exposed at this Season of the Year, by the Removal of the Buoys from the Grounds off Copenhagen annually on the 1st of November, the Admiralty, though they consider the 1st of November as the Term fixed for taking up the said Buoys, have declared that they do not intend to adhere strictly thereto, unless the Rigour of the Season shall require it, but that the said Buoys shall remain in their usual Places as long as the Season will permit.

Many Misfortunes have happened within these few Days at Sea, and upon these Coasts, from the Inclemency of the Weather, which is such as has not been equalled since the Year 1740.

Hamburg, November 29. Mr. John Schluter, a Senator of this Republick, was this Day elected Burgomaster in the room of the late Mr. Scheele.

After a Thaw, which lasted only one Day and Night, the Frost, attended by a heavy Fall of Snow, set in again on the 17th Instant with such Severity as is not remembered by any one so early in the Season; it still continues, and the Elbe upwards is frozen over, and towards the Sea large Drifts of Ice are floating with the Tide, which totally obstructs the Navigation.

Hague, December 9. The very great Fall of Snow upon the Continent renders our Communications so precarious and difficult, that we receive nothing from abroad.

*Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on or about the 22d Day of September last, the House of Mr. Lancelot Keate, of Mafham-street, Westminster, was burglariously broken and entered, and a Metal Watch, several Spoons, and several Pieces of Money, feloniously taken and carried away; that the said Goods being found the next Day on John Coleby and Charles Jones, he prosecuted them to Conviction at the Old Bailey, and at the same Time remanded said Prosecution by every Circumstance of Lenity that Truth and Humanity could suggest; that the said Malefactors suffered the Law last Wednesday; that they were both buried in St. John's Burying-Ground, Westminster, on Sunday Night last, attended by a Concourse of very disorderly Persons; that as the Funeral of these unhappy Wretches came through Messam-street, towards the Burying-Ground, they stopped at the said Mr. Keate's Door, and made a terrible Knocking thereat; that as soon as the Funeral was over, which was in about Half an Hour, the Mob and Mourners returned, and in a most outrageous and violent Manner broke up of the Windows of the said Mr. Keate's House, and threatened to set the said House on Fire, which they attempted to perpetrate by throwing lighted Links up to the Windows which were broken; that they also threatened to pull down the said House, and that they would murder Mr. Keate himself, if they caught him out of Doors; and that several of the said Persons are already taken: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the remaining Persons, who actually broke the Windows, and threw up the lighted Links as aforesaid, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, and also a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to any one of them who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, (not yet taken) so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by The Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.*

I Defier you to be so God as to ly Forty tow Pounds under a Broed Ston at the Rout of the nyest tree to the steping Stile at the bottom of the Crofte at the lower sied of the Wall on the 28 Day October, if you do not hay Stakes and your Barnes shall be burnt up and your housses and you shall car it yourself at seven o' Cloke at night, and if you set any Spies they shall be shoot throw for ther be fower of us that ar in compane to Gather that will stand to wach you and if you bring it ther you shall receive with the usere thereof and if not you and your Wife shall be shoot we will dislood therty six pestes of powder and Ball at you we are resolved to do it if you do not your Cattle and all that you have shall be dislood before the nexte Sondo so that you properly liet ther at that hour 7 at night the same way that it goos so shall it come and ly it in a poors to Gather."

That in consequence of this Letter the said Mr. John Radcliffe, of Pudsey in the Parish of Calverly in the County of York, Salter, caused an Advertisement to be inserted in a Publick Newspaper intituled The Leeds Intelligencer, offering a Reward of Ten Guineas to any one who should discover the Writer of the above Letter, and also set a Watch at every Avenue leading to the Place described, and for some Time had a Guard during the Night concealed in a Barn adjoining to his House, but without any Effect.

That on Sunday the 27th Day of November last, at Six o'Clock in the Evening, a Stack of Hay of the said Mr. John Radcliffe, which stood in a Field adjoining his House, was set on Fire, and great Part thereof consumed.

That by timely Assistance the Fire being extinguished, the said Mr. Radcliffe, in order to preserve the Remainder of the Stack, took it down, and put the Hay into Cocks in the same Field, and the next Morning, upon removing the said Cocks of Hay into his Barn, he found suck into one of the said Cocks the following incendiary Note: "We shall make a De.Mande of the Money wen Required, so do not set a thy watch aney no moor on the Garde."
