St. James's, January 18.

**T**HIS Day being kept as the Anniversary of Her Majesty's Birth-day, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties upon the Occasion. The Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired at One o'Clock, and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court, and Illuminations and other publick Demonstrations of joy in London and Westminster.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint John Cookson, John Soley, Thomas Nuthall, Richard Capper, and William Moreton Pleydell, Esqrs. to be His Majesty's Commissioners for licensing Hackney Coaches and Chairs within the Cities of London and Westminster, and Suburbs thereof; and for putting the several Acts of Parliament in Execution relating thereto.

The King has been pleased to grant unto George Rose, Esq. the Office of Surveyor of His Majesty's Revenue arising by all and all Manner of Fines, Forfeitures, and Sums of Money, commonly called Green Wax Moneys, in the Room of Charles Lowe Whytell, Esq. deceased.

*Hamburg, January 10.* The Ice on the Elbe broke up on the 6th Instant, which has enabled the Ships from different Parts, that had been frozen up at Cuxhaven, and in the River near Twilensleth, to come up to the Pales of this Port, where they safely arrived on the 8th Instant.

*Hamburg, January 13.* On a Report that the Distemper among the Horned Cattle had lately broken out again in the Counties of Oldenbourg and Delmenhorst, and in the Dutchies of Bremen and Holstein, the Senate gave immediate Orders for enquiring into the Truth of it; and by Letters from Oldenbourg, Pinneberg, and Stade, of the 17th, 28th, and 30th of last Month, it appears, that in the Counties of Oldenbourg and Delmenhorst the Cattle of only one House in each of the three Villages of Berkhausen, Neuenbrock, and Habenhausen (in which there is a numerous Stock) had been infected with the Disorder, though in East Friesland the Distemper had for these twelve Months been slowly advancing from one Part to the other; and it still continues in the Bishoprick of Munster, and the Lordships of Jever, Kniephausen and Varel. In the Dutchy of Bremen the Mortality among the Cattle had shewn itself in the Course of the Month of December last, in several Houses in one of the Villages of the District of Lahmstedt, supposed to have been caused by the Badness of the Food, owing to the rainy Season in which it was gathered last Summer. The Accounts from Pinneberg mention the Infection having lately made its Appearance among the Horned Cattle in some Parts of Holstein, viz. in the marshy Grounds of Crempe, at Suderau, Sommer, and Groeland, and in some other Places, the Lordship of Pinneberg and Elmthorn excepted. The same Letters add, that every possible Precaution had been taken by the Govern-

Whereas some false and scandalous Paragraphs have appeared this Day in The Morning Post and Gazetteer, concerning the Forgery of Bank Notes, it is thought highly necessary, to prevent Imposition upon the Public, to state the Fact.

Some Posts ago, one Ten Pound Note arrived from Holland, which, upon first Sight, the Merchant it came to thought was a Forgery, and brought it to the Bank, but did not present it for Payment; since which some few more have appeared, all from the same Plate and same Value, the whole Amount being under Two Hundred Pounds. None have been paid at the Bank, nor can any Person conversant with Bank Notes be deceived by them.
