AT the Court at St. James's, the 23d Day of January, 1775,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 28th of October last, to direct, That no Horned Cattle, nor any Manner of Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs, or other Part of any Horned Cattle or Beast, nor any Hay, Straw, Litter, Fodder, or other Things which have been employed about infected Cattle, or the Hides or any other Part of such Cattle, or have been in or near the Places where any such Infection hath been, and are liable to retain the same, should be imported from any Ports or other Places on the Coast of France, within the Districts of Picardie, Normandie, Bretagne, Poitou, Guienne, and Gascogne, into the Kingdom of Great-Britain or Ireland, or any of the Islands or Dominions thereto belonging. And whereas Information hath been received, That the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle in Gascogne hath spread itself into Languedoc.—His Majesty doth therefore judge it proper to extend the aforementioned Prohibition, and accordingly, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby Order and Command, That no Horned Cattle, nor any Manner of Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs, or other Part of any Horned Cattle or Beast, nor any Hay, Straw, Litter, Fodder, or other Things which have been employed about infected Cattle, or the Hides or any other Part of such Cattle, or have been in or near the Places where any such Infection hath been, and are liable to retain the same, shall from henceforth be imported from any Ports or other Places on the Coast of France, within the Districts aforementioned, or from any Ports or other Places within the Districts of Languedoc and Provence, into the Kingdom of Great-Britain or Ireland, or any of the Islands or Dominions thereto belonging.—And His Majesty doth further, with the Advice of His Privy Council, strictly Charge and Command all Magistrates, Constables, Officers of the Customs and Excise, to stop and destroy the several Things so prohibited as aforesaid, using and exercising in that Behalf the like Authority as any Officer or Officers have by any Law now in being in Cases of prohibited and uncustomed Goods.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Some Posts ago, one Ten Pound Note arrived from Holland, which, upon first Sight, the Merchant it came to thought was a Forgery, and brought it to the Bank, but did not present it for Payment; since which some

few more have appeared, all from the same Plate and same Value, the whole Amount being under Two Hundred Pounds. None have been paid at the Bank, nor can any Person conversant with Bank Notes be deceived by them.

The Honourable the Commissioners of the Customs hereby offer a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any who will give such Intelligence, as will tend to the Discovery of the said Crime; or who will discover the Person or Persons accessory to, or guilty thereof: The said Reward to be paid upon Conviction by the Receiver-General. The Rope, by Means of which the Robbery was committed consists of Eighteen Threds untar'd, and is no thicker than White Rope of twelve Threds usually is. It seems as if manufactur'd for the Purpose, and has been dressed in the Strands before they were laid together. It is earnestly requested that all Ropemakers and Dealers in Ropes will endeavour to recollect if any such Rope has been made or sold by them, and to whom they sold it.
