St. James, February 7, 1775.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Friday Night last, the 3d Instant, about Ten of the Clock, several wicked and ill-disposed Persons, to the Number of about Forty, armed with Cutlasses, Blunderbuss, Pistols, and other offensive Weapons, assembled together in a riotous Manner near the Watch-house in Moorfields, and broke the Windows of and fired into the said Watch-house, where the Officers of the Night were assembled and on Duty, and had a Prisoner in their Charge; and also cut, wounded, and maimed the Officers and Watchmen there in a terrible Manner, whereby two of the said Watchmen are likely to die; and there rescued and took away the said Prisoner out of the said Watch-house, and robbed one of the Officers on Duty of his Hat and Money; and also that the said riotous Persons did, on their Return from Moorfields, in passing through Half-moon alley in Bishopsgate Ward, dangerously cut and maim one of the Watchmen of the said Ward, by means of which his Life is in imminent Danger: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in committing the said Acts of Outrage and Violence, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Persons who robbed the Officer as aforesaid, or discharged the Fire-Arms, or wounded the Watchmen with their Cutlasses) who shall discover one or more of his Accomplices in the said Facts, so that he see, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty is hereby pleased to promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any Person (except as before excepted) who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid,

to be paid by The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Offenders.

And, as a farther Encouragement, a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS is hereby promised to any Person (except as before excepted) who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of one or more of the Offenders, viz. Twenty Five Pounds by the Church-wardens and Overseers of the Parish of Shore-ditch, and Twenty Five Pounds (other Half of the said Fifty Pounds) by the Deputies and Common-Council of Bishopsgate Ward.

N. B. One of the Watchmen is since dead of his Wounds.

Receiver-General's-Office, Custom-House, Edinburgh, December 27, 1774.

Whereas, upon the Night of Friday the Fourth Day of November last, this Office was broke into through one of the Windows, by Means of a Rope from above, and about a Hundred Pounds of the Publick Money, with some Papers and other Things carried off, particularly a Five Guinea Piece of King William's Reign, of a distinct Dye, and very little worn, with a small Mark upon the Edge, as if it had met with a Fall or Stroke; Five miniature Paintings from one of the Clerks Desks, viz. a St. Cecilia and a Muse, in black Frames; a Portrait of Mr. Pavillon, late Painter in Edinburgh, in a Shagreen Case; a Portrait of a Gentleman, and another of a Lady, without Frames:

The Honourable the Commissioners of the Customs hereby offer a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any who will give such Intelligence, as will tend to the Discovery of the said Crime; or who will discover the Person or Persons accessory to, or guilty thereof: The said Reward to be paid upon Conviction by the Receiver-General. The Rope, by Means of which the Robbery was committed consists of Eighteen Threads untar'd, and is no thicker than White Rope of twelve Threads usually is. It seems as if manufactur'd for the Purpose, and has been dressed in the Strands before they were laid together. It is earnestly requested that all Ropemakers and Dealers in Ropes will endeavour to recollect if any such Rope has been made or sold by them, and to whom they sold it.
