Constantinople, January 18.

BY Accounts from Marshal Romanzow's Camp, the last Division of the Troops were upon their March to Poland: If the Overflowing of the Niefter has not prevented them, they are by this Time out of the Turkish Dominions. We have had a great Fall of Snow, and an unusual cold Season.

Moscow, January 23. On Saturday last, the 21st Instant, the Rebel Pugatcheff and four of his Accomplices were executed according to their Sentences. Pugatcheff and his principal Associate named Perfilieff were beheaded; the three others were hanged; eighteen were knouted and sent to Siberia, amongst whom was an Officer who had been instrumental in fomenting the Rebellion. As soon as Pugatcheff was brought upon the Scaffold, the Detail of his Crimes and his Condemnation were twice deliberately read; he acknowledged the Justice of his Sentence, and declared to the People in a short Speech, that he was not the Person he had given himself out to be, but that he was a Don Cossack, by Name Pugatcheff. His Head is fixed on an Iron Spike over a Wheel, on which his Body and Perfilieff's are placed; and his Limbs are exposed in four different Parts of the Town, where they are to remain till to-morrow; when, it is said, all the Bodies are to be burnt together with the Scaffold. The whole of this Execution passed without the least Tumult, and Tranquillity seems to be perfectly re established. A general Pardon is said to have been published in the Provinces which were the Seat of the Rebellion.

Petersburg, January 27. The Empress intends to set out, this Evening, for Moscow from Zariko Zelo, and the Great Duke and Dutchess are to follow her Imperial Majesty on Sunday next. Count Panin is still here, and is to proceed on his Journey the latter End of next Week.

Sir Robert Gunning, His Britannick Majesty's Minister, set out from hence for Moscow on the 12th Instant.

Genoa, February 4. On the 26th past M. Peter Francis Grimaldi having finished his two Years of Magistracy, the Great Council, on the 31st, chose the most serene Brizio Giustiniano, by a Majority of Sixty-one Votes, to succeed to that Dignity.

Sir

This is perhaps the most interesting Letter you ever received as your future Safety will depend on your Answering its Demands. There are six of us who being reduced to Misery by Misfortune have pitched upon you for our Relief, Providence has made you able and it is our business to make you willing. You will therefore lay £50 Ster: below the Broad Stone on the Extremity of the South End of the Stone dike on your right hand as you go from Slophouse to Ayr and lett it be in Gold or Silver and lett it be done on the 23d or 24th of this present Month and lett it ly one Week, if it is not taken away before the Week expire you may take it Again. If you are so foolish as attempt to know who we are you are undone. One of us will uplift the Money while three Stand on the Watch with a Couple of Good Pistols each and two left at home to take Vengeance on you if you disturb the rest and a Cask of Powder ready to blow up your House — So you see that Silence is equally necessary on both Sides. You will see a Cross Scratch on the Stone by which you may know it, If ever we are able to pay you we have covenanted to do it Adieu
