THE Empress is expected to arrive tomorrow Night at a Place about six Miles from hence, where the Great Duke and Dutchess will join her Imperial Majesty on Thursday next; and, if the Cold is not too intense, they propose making a Publick Entry into this Capital a few Days afterwards.

Florence, February 18. On Tuesday last Cardinal Braschi was unanimously elected Pope. He was born at Cesena near Ravenna in the Romagna; is 58 Years of Age; was created Cardinal by the late Pope in the Year 1773; and soon after appointed Treasurer of the Apostolick Chamber. He has now assumed the Name of Pius VI.

Hamburg, February 21. We have certain Information from the Bailiffs of Holstein, Oldenberg, and Delmenhorst, that the Mortality, which had lately appeared among the Horned Cattle in those Provinces, was entirely ceased, the infected Cattle having been killed and interred with their Hides.

One of us will uplift the Money while three Stand on the Watch with a Couple of Good Pistols each and two left at home to take Vengeance on you if you disturb the rest and a Cask of Powder ready to blow up your House — So you see that Silence is equally necessary on both Sides. You will see a Cross Scratch on the Stone by which you may know it, If ever we are able to pay you we have covenanted to do it Adieu
