**L**ATE on Thursday Night last a Courier arrived here from Marshal Romanzow, with the Ratifications of the Peace, which were signed at the Porte on the 13th of January, O. S.

The Turkish Commissaries are already arrived at Chotzim, in order to settle every Thing with regard to the Stores, &c. previous to the Russian Garrison's marching out.

Nothing could exceed the Splendour and Brilliancy of the Masquerade on Friday Night last. The Empress appeared there in a Grecian Dress, attended by thirteen Noblemen and twelve Ladies of the first Rank, dressed in very magnificent Turkish Habits. Their Imperial Highnesses, the Great Duke and Dutchess, attended by an equal Number, wore the old Spanish Dress.

Orders are given for Prince Repnin's Equipages to be got ready with all possible Expedition.

*Cadix, March 7.* The Proclamation for the Flota for Vera Cruz was published here this Morning, to be ready by the first of April in next Year.

*Stockholm, March 14.* The Queen Dowager had a Court-Day at Frederickshoff on the 8th Instant. She complained of a violent Cold, which affected her Breast, and obliged her to withdraw from Sup-

per. Her Disorder increased the following Days, and produced an Inflammation of the Lungs; and and her Situation is now thought to be very critical. The King and all the Royal Family have attended her Majesty the whole Day.

*Vienna, March 15.* The Dean of the Chapter of Saltzbourg received, on Tuesday last, in the Name of his Principal, the publick Investiture of that Archbishoprick from the Hands of the Emperor.

General Giarnini, whose gallant Defence of the City of Schweidnitz in the last War was rewarded by the great Cross of the Military Order of Maria Theresia, died here a few Days ago.

*Munich, March 22.* The Archduke Maximilian arrived here on Saturday last, by way of Manheim and Augbourg, from Paris. He was received with every possible Mark of Attention. The Elector accompanied him to his several Country-Seats in the Neighbourhood of Munich; publick Diversions, unusual in the Season of Lent, were exhibited for his Amusement; the Court continued in Gala during the whole Time of his Stay here, and uncommon Magnificence was displayed upon the Occasion.

His Highness chose to have no publick Levee, and declined receiving Visits. He set out early Yesterday Morning for Vienna.
