ESENT, The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 19th of October lait, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or car-rying Coaftwife, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 19th Day of this Inftant April — And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer - His Majefty doth therefore, by and

with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby order, require, prohibit. and command, that no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever (except the Mafter Gene-ral, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majelty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 19th Day of this Instant April, prefume to transport, into any Parts out of this King-dom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or flip or lade any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition on Board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the fame into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permiffion in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy-Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuf-fering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties in-flicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of. His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to " impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation " of Salt-petre; and to inforce the law for im-" powering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation ** of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Am-** munition; and also to impower His Majesty to "reftrain the carrying Coaffwife of Salt-petre, "Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammu-"nition." And the Lords Commillioners of His Majefty's Treafury, the Commissioners for His Majefty's Treafury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majefty's Secre-tary at War, are to give the necessfary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Advertisement, for the Information of Seamen who want the Affistance of the Danish Pilots of Dra-

Ift. " goe HE Advertisement published in the Gazettes, and communicated to the Brokers, on the 8th of February 1762, (that the Signal,

goe Pilots, fhould make use of, was to be a F ag at the Top-Maft Head, or any other Maft that may beft be feen) having been neglected from Time to Time, and great Diforders having refutted from fuch Neglect, it is now again published, fo that those who may want the faid Pilots, and will not make the proper Simula impute to themfolues all the the proper Signal, mult impute to themfelves all the Delay and Neglett that may follow.

zdly, Seamen, especially those who come in in hard Weather, and make the aforesaid Signal for Pilots, must use the due Manoeuvres, either bracing up or leffening Sail, to that it may be poffible for the Pilot to get on board, without hazarding Men and Veffel: If that be not done, the Pilots are ordered not to go on board.

3dly, It is not the Duty of a Dragoe Pilot to bring Ships off Ground when they are to be unloaded; confequently they are not affected by any Complaints made, that too great a Price is affeed for that Service; but if any Perfon thinks himfelf aggrieved by his Agreement, it concerns only those with whom fuch Agreement is made

Thus, the Dragoe Pilot has nothing elfe to ob-ferve in regard to a Ship which is come or run aground, but to repair on board as foon as the Flag is hoifted at the Top Mast-Head, and, if the Captain defires it, to inform him how the Ship flands; and what is the best Manner of getting out his Warp or Anchors, in order to warp off, if possible. And in that Cafe, when a Captain defires to come off Ground by his Affiftance, and at the fame Time by Force of Sail, (yet without unloading) the Pilor. of Dragoe is permitted to affift him for fuch Price

as they can agree upon. The Duty of a Dragoe Pilot is, when a Ship makes the Signal preferibed, and has braced up or lessended Sail, to endeavour; as much as possible, to get on board, to pilot it well from the Ton or Luoy of Dragoe, or from whatever Place he comes on board, to any Place defired, to the North Ton or Buoy, to Copenhagen or it's Road, Elfenore, Malmoe, Landscrone, &c. &c. He is likewife to warn when by his Marks they are to tura from Ground, cast one or more Anchors, set to or lessen Sail, tow the Ship, bring the Stream Anchor home, with Steer-age, loof or fall. Looking out for Ships that lie at Anchor, and other such Observations, are not the Bufiness of the Pilot, as all his Marks are fore and aft and fidelong, which will confequently employ all his Attention. The Crew of the Ships mult look out for Ships, &c. and then the Pilot, upon Warning, is to inform them in what Manner they are to be avoided, without being exposed to be run foul of, or any other Danger to the Ship he is on board of, or any other.
