Moscow, April 10, N. S.

P RINCESS Repnin took Leave of the Empress and their Imperial Highnesses Yesterday, and will set out in a few Days for Kiow. The Prince's Departure will take Place soon after Easter Holidays.

Moscow, April 13, N. S. The Great Dutcheſs is now so much recovered from her late Indisposition, as to give Hopes that her Health will be entirely re-established by the Return of warm Weather.

The Season is at present very unhealthy. A putrid Fever prevails here; to prevent the Spreading of which an Order has been issued by Government, that when there are more than three People ill of it in the same House, they are to be sent to the Hospital.

A few Days ago the Court received an Account of the Delivering up of Bender and Chotzim to the Turks.

Naples, April 25. The Distemper, which lately prevailed here, is now decreasing. The Prince della Cattolica is appointed Master of the Horse to his Sicilian Majesty, in the room of the late Prince Stigliano; and the Prince Balmonto Pignatelli succeeds the Prince della Cattolica as Master of the Horse to her Majesty.

Great Preparations are making for the Festivals, which are to be given in the Month of June, on Account of the Birth of the Prince Royal. The Archduke Maximilian is expected here, in order to be present at them.

Stockholm, May 2. On the 28th past, the King of Sweden held a Chapter of his Orders, when several Promotions were made; after which General Baron Sinclair and Senator Ribbing were with great Solemnity installed, in the Chapel Royal, Knights of the Order of Seraphims.

Berlin, May 6. His Prussian Majesty came from Potsdam to Charlottenbourg this Morning, and today and to-morrow inspects the several Regiments in Garrison in this Town.

THE Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty being informed, that, notwithstanding His Majesty's Pleasure signified to His Consuls residing in Foreign Parts, several Masters of Ships and Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, which have come into the Ports where they the said Consuls reside, have upon their Demand refused to produce to them the Passes which they have received, in order to their endorsing the same in the Manner they are required to do: Their Lordships do therefore give Notice, that it is expected all such Masters of Ships or Vessels coming into any Port where there is any such Consul, do, at their Peril, strictly comply with His Majesty's Pleasure, by producing to them the Passes in their Possession; and that when any Ship or Vessel belonging to His Majesty's Subjects shall be sold at any Port abroad, where a British Minister or Consul doth reside, their Masters do deliver to such Minister or Consul their Pass; or, if no such Minister or Consul, transmit them, as soon as possibly they can, to this Office, in order to their being cancelled, that they may not, to the Prejudice of the Trade of His Majesty's Subjects, fall into the Hands of Foreigners; otherwise their Bonds will be put in Suit with the utmost Severity of the Law. And their Lordships do hereby give Notice to all Masters of Ships or Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, who may receive Passes either from this Office, or from any of the Governors of His Majesty's Foreign Islands or Plantations, that, by an Act passed in the Fourth Year of His late Majesty, it is made Felony, without Benefit of the Clergy, if any Erasure or Alteration whatever shall be found made in such Passes.
