A REPORT having been spread, and an Account having been printed and published, of a Skirmish between some of the People in the Province of Massachusetts Bay and a Detachment of His Majesty's Troops; it is proper to inform the Publick, that no Advices have as yet been received in the American Department of any such Event.

There is Reason to believe, that there are Dispatches from General Gage on board The Sukey, Captain Brown, which, though she sailed Four Days before the Vessel that brought the printed Account, is not yet arrived.

Hague, May 6. The different Corps composing this Garrison, having finished their annual Exercises, on Monday and Wednesday last, in the Plain of Waesdorp near this Town, to the entire Satisfaction of the Prince of Orange, his Serene Highness intends leaving this Place on Monday next; and will proceed to Breda, Bergenopzoom, and other Frontier Places of the Republick; and from thence will go to Loo for the Summer; to which Place her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange will go the same Day the Prince sets out.

Warsaw, May 13. The very uncommonly dry and cold Weather, which we have had for some Time past, has occasioned a great Mortality in and about this Town.

Copenhagen, May 16. On the 13th a Placart was published here, by Government, contradicting the Report lately propagated of an Intention, to suppress or reduce the Bank Notes of one Rixdollar, and promising a Reward of 1000 Rixdollars for discovering the Author of such Report; and on the 15th the Magistrates published another Placart, for suppressing riotous and tumultuous Assemblies.

Vienna, May 17. The News of the Archduchess of Milan's safe Delivery of a Prince arrived this Morning by a Courier at Schonbrunn.

Berlin, May 20. This Morning His Prussian Majesty reviewed four Regiments, and afterwards had a Levée at the Palace: Tomorrow according to Custom the great annual Military Manœuvres begin.

His Majesty was pleased, this Morning, after the Levée, to make the following Promotions; viz Lieutenant Generals Bulow and Tauenzee to the Rank of Generals of the Infantry; Major General Mullendorff to that of Lieutenant General; and the Colonels Prittwitz and Lettritz, both of the Hussars, to the Rank of Major General; besides several inferior Promotions.

General Krusnark, Commander of the Gens d'Armes, died on Monday last, after a long and painful Illness; and Yesterday Morning died of an Apoplexy, Count Schaffgotsh, Master of the Horse to His Prussian Majesty.

Colonel Quintus, after having been thought entirely recovered from a dangerous Illness, relapsed on Thursday the 9th Instant, and died the Saturday following at Potzdam.

Brussels, May 26. The Exportation of all Sorts of Corn is prohibited, under very heavy Penalties; but a special Permission has been granted, at the Requisition of the Court of France, for the Exportation of 6000 Razieres of Wheat to Rheims, to prevent any Scarcity there during the Ceremony of the Coronation.

HIS late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th Day of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Belfon, at the Admiralty-Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea-Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st of May instant; This is to give Notice, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows, whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, as soon as possible, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.
