Stockholme, Nov. 24. Hings are very much changed bere for the better, and the People who leemed a'most cast down at the ill success of Affairs, have taken great encouragement from several late advantazes of his Majellics Arms, fo that they now with cheasfulness contribute to the continuance of the War. The last Letters from our Army, said that our Troops had taken from the Enemy 400 Wagons, laden with Ammunition and Provisions, and that the Danish Army was recired to La dscroon, leaving all the Counarey open to us. The States of this Kingdom will be affembled about the middle of the next month at Gottenberg, where many of the Members are already arrived . Count Magris de la Gardie, the Crown Chantellor, hath for most of this Summer commanded an 'Army on the fide of Norway, and hath done the Kingdom great fervice, in obliging the Sieur Guldenlieu to abandon the defign he had upon Gottenburg, and to retire into Norway with the Forces under his command; and some have hereupon reported, that the command of General of the Crown, will be conferred upon him. Great preparations are making here for putting out our Fleet very early the nex year, without which it will be impossible to transport those Forces to Pomeren, which the preservation of that Countrey demands.
Coponhagen, Decemb. 12. The Armies in Schonen

lie quartered as formerly, about two Leagues distant from each o her, the Danes reaching from Landscroon to Lunds, and guarding the feveral Passes to Malmoe, to hinder any succors being sent thither. The Sucdes have fent the greatest part of their Baggage to H. Imstadt, but as yet there is not any appearance of the murch of their Armies. On Wednesday last arrived here Sieur Tromp, who gave orders for the immediate departure of 6 light Frigats for Calmar. The next day the Sieur Guldenlieu returned hither from S chonen, and to morrow he parts hence again to Elfenore, in order to his embarkation, and his passing with three Men of War to Norm y, having orders, as we are told, to affemble the Troops in those par s, and to give the Suedes a diversion on that side

during this Winter feafon. 1 to Hamburgh, Decemb. 18. We expect with much impatience the arrival of the Poll from Derimark, which ought to have come in this afternoon, for from Lubeck we have Litters which fay, that there was an ived a Veffel from Copenhigen, the Master whereof reports, that he had heard great shooting after he was come out, and that he supposed it was in Schonen, upon which many are ready to conclude that the two Armies were engaged'. Count Anthony of Oldenburg, Ambaffador and Plenipotentiary of the King of Denmirk fur the Treaty of Peace, hwing made a short stay here is gone forward on his journey to Nimeguen. The Elector of Brinden-Burg, as our Letters from Berlin advile, i drawing feveral Troops together, having, as is believed, a design in hand upon the Isle of Rugen. The Imperial Troops have forced the Lunenburgs to quit the quarters they had taken in the Countrey of Mecklenburg. The Elector of Saxony is resolute not to permit any Thoops whatsom ever so winter in his Terricories.

Struburgh, Decemb. 14. The Electoral Prince of Saxony, who hath been detained here some time by an indisposicion, is now so well recovered, that he surposes to part from hence in few dayes for Spire, and from thence to pass to Francfors. The Sieur de Monclar, who commands in chief in Alface, has made it his busis ness for these dayes past, to go from one place to the other, to visit the Garisons and the Magazines and upon the complaints made to him by the poor Inhabitants of the great oppressions they lie under, in that more Soldiers are quartered upon them than they can receive, has as we are told, promifed to give them some case in that

Francfort, Decemb. 16. The 14 instant was the day appointed for the celebration of the Emperors marriage at Passaw for which great preparations hive been made there. We have an account of the Imperial Brides being paffed through Bavaria on her way thither, having in her journey been treated by order of the Elector of Ba-varia, with great magnificence. From the Countries bordering on the Rhine, we hear of nothing but lamentations and complaints of the poor people, on occasion of the Winter quarters they are obliged to furnish. The States of Franconia, after having been affembled feveral dayes to consult concerning this marter which is so grievous to the Inhabitants, are feparated, not having been able to obtain of the Regiments defigned to winter in their Territories a delay of their murch, till they had represented things to the Imperial Court. The Imperial Ciy of Wormer hath been forced to yield, and to receive the Regiments of Sou hes, Granz, and Arc, into Gatifon there, on pretence to fecure that City and its Terrifories against the incursions of the French Garifon of Deuxponts. Belides the Lunening Troops which are quartered in the Territories of this City, the Imperial Commissions demand a considerable Sum of Money of our Magistrates, which hey will fin difficult to obtain. The Elector of Saxony has furnished his Frontier places with good Gatisons, being resolved to oppose any that shall by force endeavor to take Winter-quarters in his Dominions.

Hague, Decemb. 22. His Highness has, since his return from Zealand, had several Conferences with the Coune de Waldeck, the Count Horne, General of the Artillery, Gr. about matters relating to the next Campagne, and we are told that after Christmas, a List will be made publick of the Regiments that are to form the Army the next Summer. The States of Holland have only adjourned their Session till the beginning of the next month, in order to the finishing those matters that were before them, and especially to raise the monies necessary for the destraying the charges of the next Casti-pagne. On Thursday last, the Sieur, Mezerkroon, Ed-yoy Extraordinary of the King of Denmark, presented á Memorial to the Signes General, in which he presses them to take fuch refolution concerning the equipping a Squadron of Men of War to join with those of the King his Matter this next Summer in the Baltick, as the posture of affairs will require; in which the faid Minister is the more earnest, donehar all the advices from Stockholme,

fly that they use great endeavours there to have their Fleet at Sea very early. A Memorial hath been likewise presented by the States on the part of the King of Sueden, defiring the States will take care, that the Treaty of Commerce lately concluded between that Crown and them, be punctually executed. From Nimeguen we hear, that as yet nothing has been done for the gratifying the Princes of the Empire in the demand they make of sending Ambassadors thither; but that the difficulties-arisen by the Exceptions that had been mutually made to the Powers of the Ambassadors; were in a fair way of being removed, by their agreeing to an Expenient which had been proposed in that matter. Bruffels, Decemb. 18. This day was published herea Placaet by his Excellencies command, firifly command-Fing all Officers to repair within thrice 24 hours to their respective Garisons and Commands. We are told that the Most Christian King hath sent orders to the Mareschal d'Humieres, (which have been communica ed by the faid Mareschal to the Governors and Intendants of the spunish places) that he do not permit any of the French Subjects to pay Contributions to the Spaniards, and that on the other fide he require none from them; and if the Spaniards shall proceed to execution against any place for not paying the Contributions by them demanded, that in such case the French Governor, within whose Government such execution is made, do destroy the whole Dilhict of the Spanish Intendant, who caused the faid execution to be made; at which people here are much concerned, for that, as is faid, our Frontier Garifore cannot fublish without those Convibutions, which they cannot how require, without fetting their own Countrey in a flame. We hear that the Marquis de Rife bourg, Governor of Valenciennes, i. f fely arrived there, and that he is endeavouring to form two Regiments of the poorer fort of people, who want em loyment by zeason of the War; the like will be done in other pla-Yesterday the Prince of Barbancon, Governor of the Province of Namur, arrived here, to give his Excellency an account of the prefent condition of that Counfrey, and that Namur is in a manner blocked up by the Enemy. The Emperor, we hear, bath renewed his-orders for the Ofnabrug Troops to quit the Diocess of Co-Logue, and to take their Winter quarters in that of Liege, which was at first alotted them; but the Bishop of Ofna-Brug being gone home, his Troops will not fir with ut particular order from him.

On Sunday last, 2000 French marched from Quesnoy to The Spanish Courier is arrived, but brings no money, which we expect however by the next. Our Letters from Cologne tell us, that 400 Imperialifts were marched in great haste from Bonne to Dorsten to hinder the Brandenburg Troops from entring into the Countrey of Recklingheusen; and add, that there was a re-port, as if the Imperial Troops would by force oblige the Ofnabrugs to quit that Diocess.

Paris, Decemb. 23. It is the general expectation here, that we shall hear of some action in Flanders during this present hard From; and there are Letters from those parts which say, that in order thereunto, several Troops were drawing towards Aceb and Little However, whether this be fo or not, we are affured that the Campagne will be begun very early on this fide, and that all our Recruits will be compleated by the latter end of Februa y. Camtrav and Valmeiernes are quite blocked up by our Troops, fo that there cannot be brought any Provisions into those places, which will reduce them to great extreme ty, considering the great number of poor people that have fled whither, and who must be maintained by the publick. His Majefty has fent orders to the Governors of his places in Flanders, not to exact any Contributions from the Spanish Subjects, and not to suffer his to pay any; and that if there be occasion, they draw a Body of 4 or 5000 men together to protect them.
