Turin, June 14.

**T**HEIR Sardinian Majesties and his Royal Highness the Prince of Piedmont set out on Monday last for Chamberry: The Princesses, his Sardinian Majesty's Sisters, leave this Place Tomorrow; and the Duke and Dutchess of Chablais on Sunday next; the rest of the Royal Family will pass the Summer at Montcalier. Their Sardinian Majesties propose to stop some Days at different Places on the Road, so that they will be a Fortnight going to Chamberry.

His Majesty proposes, after he has been a few Days at Chamberry, to make a Tour into the Chablais, and his other Provinces.

Berlin, June 20. His Prussian Majesty returned on Wednesday last, in the Morning, to Potsdam, in perfect Health.

We have had for these last three Weeks a remarkable hot and dry Season; and, unless the Weather changes, it is much to be feared the Harvest will fall short.

Legue, June 27. We continue still impatient to learn what Place the Spanish Fleet, now assembled at Carthagen, will direct it's Course; in the mean while the Letters from Tunis represent the People there as being as much alarmed as their Neighbours.

Dublin, June 24.

Thursday last being the Day appointed for celebrating His Majesty's Birth-day, the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a very numerous Assembly of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, of both Sexes, at the Castle, who appeared in extraordinary Splendor to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode, set to Musick, was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency to the Ladies: and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

said Samuel Robinson, his Wife and Children, narrowly escaping with their Lives, without being able to save any Part of their Property: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person concerned in committing the said Burglary and Felony, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually set Fire to the said House) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

**W**HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Thursday the 15th Day of this instant June, George Durnford, of Cheriton in the County of Southampton, Esq; Surveyor of the Highways of the said Parish of Cheriton, received an incendiary threatening Letter, which Letter was found the Day before, by his Servant, stuck upon a Hurdle in the Sheep fold in one of his Fields; of which Letter the following is a Copy, viz.

For Gorg Donford Cherotuen squir You damd rog Donford, if you dont gif of gathering of mony of you nebers in petens for hiways to new bild your hous dam you your bildins wil be to hot for you very soon dont tak this a Jok for if ther is any mor mony gaterd by you or papers send for us to go or any tems any mor dam your blud we wil clear the parish of you very soon by shot or fier this is the first beginen so ge of.

And that the said Mr. Durnford believes the said Letter was written and stuck up by some malicious Person, on Account only of his having done his Duty as Surveyor of the Highways, according to the Direction of the Statute in that Case lately made and provided:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in writing or sticking up the said Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplice therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
