Rure will not admit of it, for that there is a necellity to provide Winter-quarters for the Troops that have ferved this Summer. The Deputy of the Elector of Suxony has, as we are informed, declared that his Mallet is refolved by no means to fuffer any Troops to enter upon his Territories, and that if any force be used, he will oppose force, to which end the other Princes of the Houfe of Saxony have refolved to join what force they can make with that of the Elector; the faid Minister adding, that if any ill confequences be produced the eby, they ought not to be impuled to his Electoral Highnels his Matter, but to those that are the first caufers of them, This Dyer hath again written a very earnest Letter to the Suiffe Cantons, to defire them not to permit in their Territoriesany Levies or Recruits to be made for the fervice of Frante. From Vienna they write, That greatelt part of the City of Ocdemb.urg, where the Protestants were permitteda he free exercife of their Religion, was by an accidental Fire burnt down to the ground in the fpace of few hours. The Imperial Troops that were in Pomerania this Campagne, are to winter in Silefia.

Francfort, Decemb. 17. We have Letters from Ratikbonne which advife, that the Elector of Bavaria had perfonally affifted at the Celebration of the Emperors Marriage at Paffaw, from whence we expect the particulats of that Ceremony, and to know the certainty of the faid advice from Ratikbonne, which is here doubted by ma ... Our Ma\_ittrates have not as yet been able to re. ve concerning the furnifhing the Sum of Money dernan 'ed by the Lunenburg Troops, which they ftill with great earnefluef, prefs for. The French Garifon in Deux-ponts very much incommodes the Neighbouring Countries by its incurfions, to be freed from which, the Countrey people are very willing to pay the Contributions demanded by them.

Cologne, Decemb. 18. The Imperial Plenipotentiary the Count Kinski is now pretty well recovered, however he will not part hence for Nimeguen till after the Holidayes. The Bifhop of Ofntbrug has, as we are informed, made an anfwer to the Emperors late orders concerning bis withdrawing his Troops out of this Diocefs, in which he fayes, that he can by no means yield to them, without exposing his Troops to utter ruine, for that in the Diocefs of Liege whicher they are ordered to remove, they should lie open to the Garifons of Limburg and Maefiricht, not having there any strong place to fecure themfelves in. The Brandenburgs feem to have quitted the defign they had of entring into the Countrey of Recklinghufen.

Liege, Decemb. 18. The great News here is ( of which however we cannot give you any certainty) that the Imperialifts will draw their Troops out of Bonne, and that a Garifon of the Duke of Newburgs Troops will be put into that City. The Sieur de Pailleroles is arrived here, with the quality of Refident of the moft Chriftian King, and 'as had Audience of our Senate. The Garifons of Namur, Charlemont and Ruremond, exact great Impositions of the Neighbouring Countries, to the utter ruine of the poor Inhabitants, who, as well as many thousands more, make countries for a Peace which may deliver the store the calamities and mifries which this War has block to poor them.

Bruffels, Decemb. 22. Until the monies which we expect from Spain arrive, we cannot begin the Recruits and new Leyies intended against the next Campagne, nor can we fatishe the Arrears of the Subsidies due to fome of our Allies, which will, we fear, make them likewife very backward in their preparations for the Campagne. We do not yet hear that our Governor General has taken any resolution in the matter of the

Contributions, which the Freuch will neither pay not demand. Our advices from all hands continue to affure us, that the Freuch not only intend to open the Campagne in these parts very early in the Spring, but likewile that they will have very powerful Armies, for the Troops that were in Lorrain under the command of the Mareschal Crequi, are faid to be marching this way.Notwithstanding the Emperors orders to the Ofnabrug Troops, they fill continue in the Diocess of Cologne; and in the mean time that Duke has sent to the Emperors Court, to represent to his Imperial Majesly the great inconveniences that will attend his removing his Troops out of that Country. Our last Spanish Letters did affure us, that orders had been given out for the equipping 25 Men of War to be employed for the defence of Sicily the next Summer.

Marseilles, Decemb. 14. At Thoulan are arrived 24 Men of War from Melling, one having been driven afhore by bad weather near Conta Vecchia, was loft, but her Cannon laved, and here are come in 10 Gallies, for that there are remaining at Melling 14 Gallies, and 7 Men of War; those that are arrived at Thom on, are to be refitted, and to return in the Spring with a frefh fuecor to Sieil.

a frelh fuecor to Sicil. Paris, Decemb. 26 The States of Languedoc have confented to the demand of three Millions made by the King, to be employed for the continuing the work of the Canal, in order to the joining the Mediterranean and the Ocean. We are told that the Duke d'enquien will part thence in few dayes, to go and hold the States of Burgundy. Here is at prefer much difcourfe of the Maringe of the Dauphin with the Princess of Buvaria. The 24 toftant, the Sieur de Hantefentle, Ambasffrdor of Mailba, performed the Ceremony of investing the Chevalier d' Ibruf with the habit of that order. From Alface our Letters tell us, that the Sieur Monclar caufed great Magazines to be provided at Saverne; and that the Soldiers and others Worked with great diligence on the Fortifications of Schleftadz, Cotmar, and other places. Our Troops likewise fortifie Monbeillard.

Falmouth, Decemb. 18. Yefterday came into this Port the Unicorn of Lindin, Captain Packe Commander, from Bautam in the Eaft Indies. The fame day arrived likewife the Lawrel of London, Captain Goffe Commander, from the Weff Indies, laden with Tobacco, and bound for Amflerdam. London, Decemb. 22. We have this day Letters from Deale, dated yefkerday, which fay that a Veffel was arrived there from the Soundr, and that the Maßer reported, that the Suedes and Danifb Army in Sconen had been engaged in a Battel, and that the former had obtained a great Victory, of which be related feveral particulars, which we puit here, for that we know not what credit ought to be given to them, till our Foreign Letters arrive from Holland or Flunders, from whence are now wanting four Mails.
