Moscow, June 19.

THE Empréss, accompanied by the Great Duke and Dutcheß, returned on Thursday last from her late Pilgrimage to the Convent of Troitska, to Kolominský, the Country Residence of the Court; from whence her Imperial Majesty came yesterday to this City, to give Audience to Count Levenhaupt, who was sent by the King of Sweden to notify his Majesty's Arrival on the Frontiers of this Empire: Count Levenhaupt is to return to the King his Master before he quits Finland.

An Explanation has been published relative to the Tax of One per Cent. laid on the Capitals of Merchants, by which it is confined to the Sums they may have circulating in Trade, and is not to affect any other Part of their Property.

Madrid, July 3. By the last Advices from Carthagena we learn, that the Fleet (which sailed on the 23d past, but had been detained by a strong Easterly Wind) proceeded on its Voyage on the 27th, and was out of Sight in the Evening.

The Court arrived here on the 30th of last Month from Aranjuez.

Stockholm, July 4. The King arrived the Day before Yesterday in the Afternoon, in perfect Health, in our Road with the Squadron coming from Abo. The Queen and the Duke of Ostrogothia went in Sloops to meet his Majesty. The Dutcheß of Sudermania waited for his Majesty under a Triumphal Arch erected on the Bridge where his Majesty landed about Six in the Evening.

Stockholm, July 7. Yesterday the Garrison of this City marched to their Encampment in the Park, with the King at their Head, accompanied by the Duke of Ostrogothia.

Marseilles, July 10. Three Days ago, a Vessel arrived in this Port from Algiers, having on Board the Families and Effects of the Consuls of several Nations.

Dresden, July 12. For this Fortnight past we have every Day had Storms of Thunder and Lightning: On Saturday last the Lightning set Fire to the Elector's Palace, and burned Part of the Furniture, and some of the Beams in the great Apartment; but as the Accident happened in the Day-time, immediate Assistance was procured, which prevented any considerable Damage.

The King has been pleased to appoint John Wallace, Esq; to be His Majesty's Consul at Bergen, in the Room of his Father, Alexander Wallace, Esq; who has resigned.
