Censors of the College of Physicians Examination.

IN our late Examination of the Shops of the Apothecaries and others, who compound and sell Medicines within the City and Suburbs of London, we discovered that a false Tinctura Thebaica, prepared with a distilled Spirit instead of Wine, was sometimes sold; by means of which Alteration a Tincture of Opium (in the Dose of which the greatest Exactitude is necessary) may probably be made, containing a Proportion of that powerful Drug, very different from that which is contained in the genuine Tinctura Thebaica of the Pharmacopoeia of the College of Physicians of London.

We likewise discovered that a Tincture of Aloe, prepared in like Manner with a distilled Spirit instead of Wine, was in some Shops substituted for Tinctura Sacra, and sold as such, though differing from it in a Circumstance of no small Moment.

It was likewise found, that the Symplicum e Eleonorio was in some Shops not made according to the Pharmacopoeia of the College; but that some other Symplicum, with an Addition of Tinctura Thebaica, was substituted for it; and that in other Shops, though the proper Materials were used, the Composition was carelessly prepared.

We therefore, the Censors of the College of Physicians, think it our Duty to take Public Notice of these Deviations from the established Orders of the College; and, by Virtue of the Authority committed to us by Law, we do hereby require all Persons within our Jurisdiction, whose Business it is to prepare and sell Medicines, as well with Respect to the other official Compositions as to those particularly mentioned above, strictly to follow the Directions published by the College, and not to sell any compound Medicine whatever, under the Title used in the London Pharmacopoeia, which has not been prepared with the Ingredients, and according to the exact Method there prescribed.
