There having been feveral Errors in the Printing of the Address to His Majesty, from the Council and General Affembly of the Island of Antigua, (which was inferted in last Saturday's Gazette) it has been thought proper to reprint it.

Whitehall, August 5.

HE following Address to The King, from the Council and General Affembly of Antigua, having been delivered to the Earl of Dartmouth, one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, by Mr. Salmond, Agent for that Island, hath been prefented to His Majefty; and was very gracioufly received.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Council and General Assembly of this your Island of Antigua, impressed with the most unalterable Sentiments of Loyalty, humbly beg Leave, at this Time, to convey our Assurances of them to your Majefty, joined with our moft un-feigned and grateful Thanks for the many In-flances of your paternal Care extended to us, although remotely placed from your Throne and Royal Prefence.

Your Majesty's Wildom and Attention to the Interest and Welfare of all your People, we must, in common with our Fellow-Subjects, participate in the due Acknowledgments of; but it is with Hearts full of peculiar Duty and Gratitude we acknow-ledge that Regard and Attention to us, which is ftrongly expressed by your Majesty in the Choice of itrongly expressed by your Majerty in the Choice of that Governor, whom you have been pleafed to ap-point over us; whofe unwearied Zcal to your Ma-jefty's Service, and Regard to the juft Rights and Liberties of your People, are fo fensibly felt by us, as to mark in him the happy Confequences of that Choice.

When we reflect on the able and mild Exercife of Power in our excellent Chief Governor, your Majesty's Servant, Sir Ralph Payne, Knight of the Bath ; and at the fame Time fee how other Govern-ments have been rent by Faction, while we have lived in a continued State of Union and Tranquility, we cannot reftrain our Expressions of Attach-ment and Affection to him, as the true Representative of the Royal Master.

Thus endeared to us by his Conduct, from a faith-ful Difcharge of that high Truft with which you have honoured him, permit us, Sire, on the Departure of our Governor for Europe, to supplicate your most gracious Favor for the Reception of him into your Prefence, with fuch Marks of your Royal Counte-

nance and Approbation as must be a Reward of his faithful Services, and an Acceptance of our Teftimonial of Gratitude. And permit us further in our Supplication to add, that your Majefty would con-defcend to indulge the Wifnes of your faithful Subjects of Antigua, by rendering them again happy in his Return to the Exercise of the Government of thefe your Leeward Islands.

(except the Perfor who actually wrote the faid Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty is bereby pleased to promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any Person (except as before excepted) who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid; to be paid by the Righs Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Convittion of one or more of the Offenders.
