THE Porte is taken up at present in making Preparations against Kherim Khan of Persia, who is suspected of Design against Busfarah and Bagdat: A Ship is actually loading with Ammunition and warlike Stores for Scanderoon, to be sent from thence to Bagdat.

Naples, July 18. Two Engineers have been sent to Brindisi, his Sicilian Majesty having determined to make a Port there with all Expedition.

Stockholm, August 1. An Ordinance has been published by the College of Commerce, permitting the Importation of Worthead Yarn, subject to a small Duty, and offering Rewards to such Persons as shall form new Establishments for Spinning.

Corn has risen considerably in Price of late, both on Account of the Restrictions laid upon the Distillery, and of the excessive Heat and Drought of the Summer.

Their Swedish Majesties reside at present at Eckolund, accompanied as usual by several of the Nobility.

Dresden, August 9. His Serene Highness the Elector of Saxony, having accompanied the reigning Electress to the Baths of Lauchfaldt, returned to Dresden last Friday. On Saturday there was a Drawing-Room in the Evening. On Monday the Elector reviewed the Horse Guards, and went the same Day to his Summer Residence at Pilmnitz. His Highness Prince Maximilian, the Elector's youngest Brother, is ill of an Inflammation on the Lungs.

Paris, August 9. The Sardinian Ambassador, who was charged with a Commission from his Sardinian Majesty, to demand the Princess Clotilda in Marriage for the Prince of Piedmont, made his publick Entry Yesterday at Versailles; his Suite was numerous, his Equipage magnificent, and his Pages and Servants very richly dressed: A great Dinner was afterwards given by his most Christian Majesty in the *Salle des Ambassadeurs*; to which all the Ministers of State, and the Foreign Ministers, were invited; the Table was of fifty Covers. Prince de Marfan, a Prince of Lorraine, who went to Paris to receive the Ambassador in one of the King's Coaches, did the Honours of the Dinner.

Hague, August 11. The Prince of Orange returned to this Place last Night, in perfect Health, from Loo.
