*For suppressing Rebellion and Sedition.*

**W**HEREAS many of Our Subjects in divers Parts of Our Colonies and Plantations in North America, misled by dangerous and ill-designing Men, and forgetting the Allegiance which they owe to the Power that has protected and sustained them, after various disorderly Acts committed in Disturbance of the Public Peace, to the Obstruction of lawful Commerce, and to the Oppression of Our loyal Subjects carrying on the same, have at length proceeded to an open and avowed Rebellion, by arraying themselves in hostile Manner to withstand the Execution of the Law, and traitorously preparing, ordering, and levying War against Us; And whereas there is Reason to apprehend that such Rebellion hath been much promoted and encouraged by the traitorous Correspondence, Counsels, and Comfort of divers wicked and desperate Persons within this Realm: To the End therefore that none of Our Subjects may neglect or violate their Duty through Ignorance thereof, or through any Doubt of the Protection which the Law will afford to their Loyalty and Zeal; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby declaring that not only all Our Officers Civil and Military are obliged to exert their utmost Endeavours to suppress such Rebellion, and to bring the Traitors to Justice; but that all Our Subjects of this Realm and the Dominions thereunto belonging are bound by Law to be aiding and assisting in the Suppression of such Rebellion, and to disclose and make known all traitorous Conspiracies and Attempts against Us, Our Crown and Dignity; And We do accordingly strictly charge and command all Our Officers as well Civil as Military, and all other Our obedient and loyal Subjects, to use their utmost Endeavours to withstand and suppress such Rebellion, and to disclose and make known all Treasons and traitorous Conspiracies which they shall know to be against Us, Our Crown and Dignity; and for that Purpose, that they transmit to One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, or other proper Officer, due and full Information of all Persons who shall be found carrying on Correspondence with, or in any Manner or Degree aiding or abetting, the Persons now in open Arms and Rebellion against Our Government within any of Our Colonies and Plantations in North America, in order to bring to condign Punishment the Authors, Perpetrators, and Abettors of such traitorous Designs.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the 23d Day of August, 1775, in the Fifteenth Year of Our Reign.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 5th of April last, to direct, that no Person or Persons whatsoever

should, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the 19th Day of the said Month of April, presume to transport out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council; and whereas there is great Reason to suspect, that great Fraud and Collusion have been and may be practised in the Shipping and Exportation of Gunpowder, Arms, and Ammunition, under Licences which have been already granted;—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby revoke and make void all and every Licence and Permission which have been hitherto granted for the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that, during the Space of Three Months from the Date of this His Majesty's Order in Council, no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do presume, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

G O D save the K I N G.

*Moscow, July 24.* N. S. Marshal Romanzow arrived at Kolominski on Thursday last; and was received by the Empress with every possible Mark of Satisfaction: He declined the Honour of a triumphal Entry, which was intended him, and for which magnificent Preparations had been made.

On Friday Morning the Empress, accompanied by the Great Duke and Dutcheis, and attended by the great Officers and Ladies of the Court, the Knights being in the Habits of their respective Orders, walked in grand Procession from the old Palace in the Kremlin to the Cathedral, where solemn Mass was performed by the Archbishop of Peterburgh, and Te Deum sung for the Conclusion of the War; after which her Imperial Majesty, having returned in Procession to the Hall called Granovitaia in the old Palace, was addressed by the Procureur General, in the Name of the whole Empire, in an Harangue full of Expressions of the deepest Gratitude for the Blessings which her Reign had produced, and particularly for that recent one, the Restoration of publick and domestick Tranquillity, which her Wisdom had so happily accomplished: To which the Vice-Chancellor made a short but gracious Answer, in the Name of his Sovereign; after which the five first Classes of the Nobility had the Honour of kissing her Majesty's Hand. The Keeper of the Privy Purse then read aloud a List of the Gratifications and Rewards, which the Empress was pleased to bestow upon this Occasion. Amongst the principal ones were;

To Marshal Romanzow, an Estate of 5000 Peasants, 100,000 Roubles in Money, a Service of Plate, a Hat with a Wreath of Laurel, enriched with precious Stones to the Value of 30,000 Roubles, a Diamond Star and Shoulder-Knot, a Marshal's Staff, and a Diploma adding to his Surname that of *Sadounaiskoy*, which may be translated, *The Ultra-Danubian*.

To Count Alexis Orlov 60,000 Roubles, and a Sword enriched with Diamonds of very considerable Value, and a Diploma granting to him the Surname of *Chefne*.

To General Potemkin, a Diploma of Count of the Russian Empire, and her Imperial Majesty's Picture set with Diamonds to be worn by him.

To General Panin, 60,000 Roubles, with a Sword and Diamond Star.

The same to Prince Dolgorouki.

To Count Soltikow, the second Order of St. George.

To Count Ivan Czernichew, the Order of St. Andrew.

Several Ribbons of St. Alexander Newsky were conferred, and Military Promotions made.

Admiral Greig was advanced to the Rank of Vice-Admiral, and appointed Commandant of Cronstadt.

On Saturday the Great Duke bestowed Eleven Ribbons of the Order of St. Anne.

Yesterday there was a very brilliant Court both Morning and Evening, and a Ball and Supper; but unhappily the Foreign Ministers were disappointed of the Honour, that was intended them, of complimenting the Empress on the present joyful Occasion, her Imperial Majesty being indisposed through the Fatigue of the Ceremonies on Friday, which has also made it necessary to postpone the Entertainments intended for Tomorrow.

Large Gold Medals, struck upon the present Occasion, have been distributed to the Feldt-Mmarshals, Generals in Chief, and Foreign Ministers; and some of a smaller Size to the Rest of the Nobility of the five first Classes.

*Venice, August 4.* The Crops throughout this State are so plentiful, that it is hoped they will suffice for the Consumption of four Years.

*Brussels, August 18.* The Harvest in this Country is almost finished, at an earlier Period than usual, and proves to be more plentiful than has been known for many Years past.

St. James's, August 26, 1775.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Monday Night last, the 21st Instant, between Eight and Nine o'Clock, Two Gentlemen in a Single Horse Chair were stopped on the Wandsworth Road, near the Five Mills Stone, by several Persons, believed to be Six or Seven, and robbed of their Money, and one of the Gentlemen of his Watch, the other of his Watch-Chain; after which one of the Footpads fired a Pistol, and wounded one of the Gentlemen very badly in the Face, inso much that his Life is despaired of: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually fired the Pistol) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
