

Whitehall, September 1, 1775. HE House of Representatives of the Province of Nova Scotia in North America, having unanimoufly agreed to a Loyal and Dutiful Addrefs, Petition and Me. morial to the King's most Excellent Majelty, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons of Great Britain in Parliament affembled, containing Declarations of their Obedience and Submission to the Authority of the Parliament of Great Britain, as the Supreme Legislature of that Province, and of all the British Dominions ; and of their Readiness, as an indifpensable Duty, to submit to the Payment of fuch Taxes, to be raifed upon a permanent Plan, and at the Difpolal of Parliament, as shall be their due Proportion of the Expences of the Empire; And William Nefbitt, Efq; Speaker of the faid Houfe of Reprefentatives, having transmitted a Transcript of the faid Loyal and Dutiful Address, Petition and Memorial to the Earl of Dartmouth, one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, it was this Day preferred to His Majeffy, and it was this Day prefented to His Majefty, and most gracioufly received.

The Vizir was depofed on the 6th Inftant, banifhed to Gallipoly, and after-wards appointed Pafcha of Heydin; the Cheaia, Dervish Achmet Effendi, is named Vizir; and Ibrahim Effendi, formerly Cheaia at the Camp, is ap-pointed Vizir Cheaia. Arab Kerly Ibrahim, Paf-cha of Candia, has been appointed Pafcha of Cairo.

Syria, to re-establish Order in those Parts. Moscow, July 28. N.S. The Counters Roman-zow, Mother of the Marshal, has received a very distinguished Mark of the Empreis's Favour, by being invetted with the Order of St. Catherine.

. Moleow, August 7. On Monday Evening last the three Regiments of Guards, which are here, marched out to a Camp formed near the Place called Chodinka, about three Werfls from Town, which was defined for the Scene of the remaining Feftivities for the Celebration of the Peace. In the Decoration of this Place, the Map of the Crimea and of the Black Sea had been followed with as much Exactness as local Circumstances would permit, by the Erection of Buildings representing the several For-tresses, upon the Coast of that Sea. These were elegantly adorned on the Infide, and accommodated to different Purpofes. Kinburn, Jenicale, Taganrok, Azow, and imaller Forts, were Theatres, Sa. loons, Shops, Dining-Halls, Temples, and Ar-cades for Illuminations, &c. and in the Harbours-were feen large Ships and Galleys compleatly rigged ; which, befides contributing greatly to the Beauty of the Scene, ferved for Galleries for the Company, and for other Ufes.

Tuefday at Noon a Treat was given to the Populace, conflicting of roafted Oxen, and great Quanti-ties of Provision, with Fountains of Wine; at the fame Time they were amufed with the Feats of Rope dancers and Tumblers, and feveral other Diverfions calculated to entertain them. The Empreis, their Imperial Highneffes, and the whole Court, were Spectators of this from the Saloons of Kerche and Jenicale, which were joined by a Pavilion ; after which, the Foreign Ministers had the Honour, of dining with her Imperial Majesty in the Hall of Azow, where circular Tables were alfo fpread for the Five first Classes of the Nobility. A French Comedy at the new Theatre (Kinburn) concluded

the Entertainments of the Day. On Thurfday Evening, the laft of the Pettivals, there was a French Comedy at the Theatre at Cho-dinks, which the Empress and the Great Duke and Dutchels honoured with their Profence In In the mean while, the Temples, Arcades, &ç. erected for the Purpofe, and the Ships and Galleys, were illuminated with coloured Lamps in the most elegant Manner, as well as the neighbouring and more remote Country Seats, which had the fineft Effect imaginable. The Publick Mafked Ball after the Play was very numerous and brilliant. The Empress distributed Presents, at the Shops, to her Maids of Honour; and ordered a Gold Medal, of Twenty Ducats Value, to be given to each of the Shopkeepers; after which, her Imperial Majefty viewed the Fireworks from a Gallery in the largest Ship, and was pleafed to express great Satisfaction at the Manner in which the whole of the Entertainments upon this happy Occasion had been conducted.

Hague, August 18. Their High Mightinesses the States General have this Day iffued a Proclamation, of which the following is a Translation :

PROCLAMATION. HE States General of the United Provinces, To all who shall fee, or hear these Prefents read, Greeting :

Be it known that, as the Reafons, which induced

munition to the English Colonies, All subfish, We have again thought fit abfolutely to prohibit, and We hereby abfoliately do prohibit, all Exportation of Ammunition, Gunpowder, Guns and Shot, by Ships belonging to the Dominions of Great Britain, for the further Term of a Year, on Pain, not only of Confifcation of the Arms and Ammunition, which shall be found there on board, but also of a Fine of a Thousand Guilders over and above, at the Charge of the Commander, whole Ship shall be answerable and liable to Execution for the fame.

That We have further thought fit to enach, and We do hereby enact, that, during the aforefaid fur-ther Term of one Year, no Gunpowder, Guns, Shot, or other Inftruments of War, fhall be embarked on board any other Ships, whether Foreign, or belonging to this Country, to be transported abroad, without Confent and Permission of the College of Admiralty, under whole Jurifdiction the Embarkation shall be made, on Pain of Confifcation of the Arms, Gunpowder, Guns, Shot, or other Ammunition, which shall have been embarked without Permiffion, and of the Commander's incurring a Fine of a Thousand Guilders, on board of whose Ship the faid Arms and Ammunition shall have been embarked, and his Ship be answerable and liable to Execution for the faid Fine.

And that no one may pretend Ignorance hereof, We call upon and require the States, the Heredi-tary Stadtholder, the Committee of Council, and the Deputations of the States, of the respective Provinces, and all other the Officers and Juffices of these Countries, to cause this Our Proclamation to be forthwith promulgated, published, and affixed in all Places where the fame is neceffary, and where fuch Publication is wont to be made; And We further charge and command the Counfellors of the Admiralty, the Advocates General, and Commis General, together with all Admirals, Vice-Admirals, Captains, Öfficers and Commanders, to pay Obedience to this Our Froclamation, proceeding, and caufing to be proceeded against the Transgreffors thereof, withour Favour, Connivance, Diffimulation, or Composition; for such have We found meet.
