Cadix, August 11.

THIS Afternoon arrived from the Havana, under the Command of Rear-Admiral Don Adrian Caudron Cantin, the St. Michael, and Astuto, of 70 Guns each, and the Urcas St^a Rita, St. Carlos and St. Joseph. The Treasure they bring is Seven Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, and about the Value of a Million and an Half in Cochineal and other Effects.

Warsaw, August 16. On the 13th of this Month died here, at the Age of 81, Prince Michael Czartoryski, Great Chancellor of Lithuania.

Brussels, September 1. On Sunday last the Prince of Starhemberg arrived here from Vienna, after an Absence of four Months; and Yesterday (his Royal Highness Prince Charles being in the Country) he invested the Chancellor of Brabant, and his Brother M. de Crumpipen, with the Ensigns of the Order of St. Stephen.

St. James's, September 5.

The King has been pleased to appoint Joseph Curtoys, Esq; to be His Majesty's Consul at Barcelona.

The King has been pleased to grant unto James Prevost, of the Parish of St. James in the City of Westminster, Esq; Lord of Bessinge in the Territory of the Republick of Geneva, Lieutenant-General, and Colonel of the 60th Regiment of Foot in His Majesty's Service, His Royal Licence and Authority, that he, and his Issue by his Wife Anna-Louisa, may assume and take the Surname of Mackay only, and also bear the Arms of Mackay, of Scowrey in the Shire of Sutherland in Scotland, pursuant to the Will of Hugh Mackay, of Scowrey, Esq; deceased at Breda, late Lieutenant-General and Colonel of His Majesty's Regiment of Scotch Infantry in the Service of the States General, (such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office;) and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

IT is His Majesty's Command, that all the Officers appointed from Half Pay to the additional Companies now forming in Ireland, do immediately repair to Dublin, and follow the Orders they have received, on Pain of His Majesty's Displeasure.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 23^d Day of August, 1775,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 5th of April last, to direct, that no Person or Persons whatsoever

should, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the 19th Day of the said Month of April, presume to transport out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council; and whereas there is great Reason to suspect, that great Fraud and Collusion have been and may be practised in the Shipping and Exportation of Gunpowder, Arms, and Ammunition, under Licences which have been already granted;—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby revoke and make void all and every Licence and Permission which have been hitherto granted for the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that, during the Space of Three Months from the Date of this His Majesty's Order in Council, no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do presume, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS Patrick Nevil, a Native of the City of Waterford in the Kingdom of Ireland, embarked from thence some Time in the Year 1753, being then between 62 and 63 Years of Age; since which no satisfactory Account has been received of his being alive or dead, though published several Times in the London Gazette in the Year 1764; but, by the last Accounts his only surviving Sister Mary Nevil Murphey, a Resident in Waterford aforesaid, received, it appears, that the said Patrick Nevil died at Jamaica in the Year 1756, as certified by one Captain Andrew Harney, a Dublin Trader. He was about five Feet ten Inches high, somewhat gross, smooth faced, much swarthy, occasioned by the Jaundice and a paralytic Disorder in his Head, with which he was very much afflicted. Any Person that can give a proper and authentic Account of his Death without lawful Issue, shall receive as a Reward the Sum of 10 l. Sterling; and a Reward of 20 l.
