WHEREAS Patrick Nevil, a Native of the City of Waterford in the Kingdom of Ireland, embarked from thence some Time in the Year 1753, being then between 62 and 63 Years of Age; since which no satisfactory Account has been received of his being alive or dead, though published several Times in the London Gazette in the Year 1764; but, by the last Accounts his only surviving Sister Mary Nevil Murphey, a Resident in Waterford aforesaid, received, it appears, that the said Patrick Nevil died at Jamaica in the Year 1756, as certified by one Captain Andrew Harney, a Dublin Trader. He was about five Feet ten Inches high, somewhat gross, smooth faced, much swarthy, occasioned by the Jaundice and a paralytic Disorder in his Head, with which he was very much afflicted.
