A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Fourteenth Day of this Instant September; We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Fourteenth Day of this Instant September, to Thursday the Twenty-sixth Day of October next: And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Twenty-sixth Day of October next, be held for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give Attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Twenty-sixth Day of October next.

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Sixth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-five, in the Fifteenth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

St. Idesphonso, August 21. Last Night his Royal Highness the Prince of Asturias attended his Catholic Majesty in his Closet, at the Dispatch of Business with the Minister for Foreign Affairs: And his Royal Highness will for the future regularly assist on the like Occasions.

Stockholm, August 22. We have received from Abo the melancholy News, that a Fire lately happened there, by which above Two Hundred Houses, and Fifteen Mills, had been consumed, and some Lives lost.

St. James's, September 9.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Charles Toll, of Preston Deanery in the County of Northampton, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Leave and Licence to take and use the Surname and bear the Arms of Newman, (the same being first duly exemplified and registered, according to the Laws of Arms, in the Heralds Office;) and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 5th of April last, to direct, that no Person or Persons whatsoever should, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the 19th Day of the said Month of April, presume to transport out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal

Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) without Leave or Permission, in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council; and whereas there is great Reason to suspect, that great Fraud and Collusion have been and may be practised in the Shipping and Exportation of Gunpowder, Arms, and Ammunition, under Licences which have been already granted;— His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby revoke and make void, all and every Licence and Permission which have been hitherto granted for the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that, during the Space of Three Months from the Date of this His Majesty's Order in Council, no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do presume, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts, beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-petre, and to enforce the Law for impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
