The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 5th of April last, to direct, that no Person or Persons whatsoever

should, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the 19th Day of the said Month of April, presume to transport out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council; and whereas there is great Reason to suspect, that great Fraud and Collusion have been and may be practised in the Shipping and Exportation of Gunpowder, Arms, and Ammunition, under Licences which have been already granted;— His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby revoke and make void all and every Licence and Permission which have been hitherto granted for the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that, during the Space of Three Months from the Date of this His Majesty's Order in Council, no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do presume, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 20th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-petre, and to inforce the Law for impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
