Extract of a Letter from the Honourable Lieu -tenant-General Gage to the Earl of Dart-mouth, dated Boston, August 20, 1775.

R. Washington, who commands the Re-bel Army, has written to me on the Subject of the Treatment of the Rebel Prifoners in our Cuflody, a Copy of whofe Letter I transmit your Lordship, together with a Copy of my Answer. Major Skene, made Prifoner at Philadelphia, is fent into Counecticut, where he is to be confined with fome others; and I underftand they make War like Savages, making Captives of Women and Children.

The Rebels are very numerous, and continue to throw up Works, in fome Points nearer to the Town than before. Their advanced Parties have been drove back both at Bofton and Charles Town, and their Posts destroyed. They landed a large Body a fecond Time at the Light-House, where they made Prisoners of a few Marines, posted there by the Ad-miral, and ten or twelve Carpenters, who were repairing the Houfe.

A Fleet of Uransports, who had been out in Search of live Stock, is just returned with about Eighteen Hundred Sheep, and above One Hundred Head of Oxen, which will be fome Relief to the Troops in general, and of great Benefit to the Hofpitals.

Copy of a Letter from George Washington, Esq; to bis Excellency Lieutenant-General Gage. SIR,

Understand that the Officers engaged in the Caufe of Liberty and their Country, who, by the Fortune of War, have fallen into your Hands, have been thrown indiferiminately into a common Gaol appropriated for Felons; that no Confideration has been had for those of the most respectable Rank, when languishing with Wounds and Sickness; that fome have been even amputated in this unworthy Situation.

Let your Opinion, Sir, of the Principle which actuates them be what it may, they suppose they act from the noblest of all Principles, a Love of Freedom and their Country. But political Opinions, I conceive, are foreign to this Point; the Obligations arifing from the Rights of Humanity and Claims of Rank are univerfally binding and extensive, except in Cafe of Retaliation. Theie, I should have hoped, would have dictated a more tender Treatment of those Individuals, whom Chance or War had put in your Power. Nor can I forbear fuggefting its fatal Tendency to widen that unhappy Breach, which you, and those Ministers under whom you act, have repeatedly declared you wifhed to fee for ever clofed.

My Duty now makes it necessary to apprize you, that, for the Future, I shall regulate my Conduct towards those Gentlemen, who are or may be in our Poffeffion, exactly by the Rule which you shall ob- | ferve towards those of ours who may be in your

Custody. If Severity and Hardship mark the Line of your Conduct, (painful as it may be to me) your Phisoners will feel its Effects; but if Kindnefs and Humanity are shewn to ours, I shall with Pleafuse confider those in our Hands only as unfortunate, and they shall receive the Treatment to which the Unfortunate are ever inticled.

I beg to be favoured with an Answer as foon as poffible, and am, &c.

Copy of a Letter from bis Excellency Lseutenant-General Gage to George Washington, Elq;

SIR.

O the Glory of civilized Nations, Ilumanity and War have been compatible, and Compaffion to the Subdued is become almost a general Syltem.

Britons, ever pre-eminent in Mercy, have out-gone common Examples, and overlooked the Cri-minal in the Captive. Upon these Principles your Prisoners, whose Lives by the Law of the Land are defined to the Cord, have hitherto been treated with Care and Kindnefs, and more comfortably lodged than the King's Troops in the Hofpitals, indiferiminately it is true, for I acknowledge no Rank that is not derived from the King.

My Intelligence from your Army would justify fevere Recrimination. I understand there are of the King's faithful Subjects, taken fome Time fince by the Rebels, labouring, like Negro Slaves, to gain their daily Subfittence, or reduced to the wretched Alternative, to perifh by Famine, or take Arms against their King and Country. Those who have made the Treatment of the Prisoners in my Hands, or of your other Friends in Bofton, a Pretence for fuch Measures, found Barbarity upon Falsehood.

I would willingly hope, Sir, that the Sentiments of Liberality, which I have always believed you to poffefs, will be exerted to correct these Misdoings: Be temperate in political Disquisition : Give free Operation to Truth, and punish those who deceive and misrepresent, and not only the Effects, but the Causes of this unhappy Conflict will be removed.

Should those, under whose usurped Authority you act, controll fuch a Disposition, and dare to call Severity Retaliation, to God, who knows all Hearts, be the Appeal for the dreadful Confequences. I truft, that British Soldiers, afferting the Rights of the State, the Laws of the Land, the Being of the Constitution, will meet all Events with becoming Fortitude. They will court Victory with the Spirit their Caule infpires, and from the fame Motive will find the Patience of Martyrs under Misfortune.

Advices have been received from North Carolina, that the Diforders in that Province having continued to increase, Governor Martin had judged it neces-fary to abandon Fort Johnson on Cape Fear River, where he had lately fixed his Refidence; and to remove the Cannon and Stores under the Protection of His Majefly's Sloop Cruizer, on Board of which he had retired; and that on the Night of the 18th of July, a confiderable Number of Perfons had entered Fort Johnson, and set Fire to the Buildings, which being of Wood were entirely confumed.

Chamberry, September 8. Her Royal Highnefs the Princels of Piedmont arrived at this Place on Wednefday laft. The King and Queen of Sardinia, with their whole Family, went to meet her Royal Highness at Les Echelles, where they dined, and about Eight in the Evening made their Publick Entry into Chamberry. They were efforted by a confiderable Number of Dragoons, Horfe Guards, and a Body of Light Dragoons confifting of most of the principal Inhabitants and Burgefles, who em-bodied themfelves upon this Occasion. They were followed by a numerous Train of Coaches, the Maison du Roy, together with many of the Nobility and Gentry on Horfeback. On their Arrival they alighted at the Royal Chapel, where the Marriage Ceremony was performed, and an elegant Difcourfe pronounced by the Archbifhop. The Marriage was immediately notified to the People by a Discharge of the Cannon and Musquetry of all the Troops assembled here. Upon leaving the Chapel their Sardinian Majefties and their Royal High-neffes retired for about Half an Hour into the Queen's Clofet, after which they came into the Drawing-Room, where the Ladies were prefented to the Princefs, and had the Honour of kiffing her Royal Highnefs's Hand. The Court was in great Gala on this Occafion, and the Town and Theatre were illuminated.

Yesterday Morning the Foreign Ministers in a Body had the Honour of being prefented to their Royal H.ghneffes the Prince and Princess of Piedmont, and were most graciously received.

Monfieur and Madame de Provence are expected here this Day: During their Refidence at Cham-berry they will take the Title of Vendome.

Their Sardinian Majesties, with the whole Royal Family, quit this Place on the 25th of this Month, and propole staying a short Time at Rivoli ; after which they will make their publick Entry into Turin.
