W E, the Gentlemen, Clergy, Merchants, and Traders, of the Town of Liverpoole in the County Palatine of Lancaster, humbly beg the County Falatine of Lancalter, hambly beg Leave to lay before your Majelty the Addrefs of a faithful and loyal People, to teltify our firm and warm Attachment to your Majefty's illuftrious Fa-mily, the Honor of your Crown, and the Dignity of your Empire. We effect it particularly our Duty, at this Time, to declare to the World our Affection to your Royal Perfou, and our Deteftation of the open and daring Contempt flown to the legal Authority and conflictutional Powers of thefe Realins by fome of your Majcity's deluded and re-bellious Subjects in America.

The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, Traders, and Principal Inhabitants, of the City of Coventry.

Moft Gracious Soucreign, T is with the deepett Concern we have for fome Time observed the Progress of those pernicious Principles which the Patrons of Sedition have been industrioufly infinuating into the Minds of your Majefty's deluded Subjects, and which have at length produced an actual Rebellion among the unhappy Colonists in America; a Rebellion the most atrocious, because altogether unprovoked; the most unnatural, because excited and fomented by the false Representations and Encouragement of a desperate domestic Faction.

At fuch an alarming Crifis, Silence, in the true Friends to their Country, would be utterly inexcufeable; not to condemn the Guilty, were, in some Sort, to partake in their Iniquity : Whilit therefore we deplore this Error in our Fellow-Subjects, we cannot forbear to remark, how very inattentive those Perfons must needs be to the Welfare of the Community, who can wantonly interrupt the Public Repose by raising Tumults and Infurrections, from no other Motive, and with no better view, than to promote the Schemes of pretended Patriotifm, or to footh the Malice of difappointed Ambition. The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS His Majesty was pleafed, by His Order in Council of the 23d Day of August last, to prohibit the Exportation out of this Kingdom into any Parts beyond the Seas, or Carrying Coaltwife, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, for and during the Space of Three Months from the Date of the faid Order: And whereas His Majefty judges it neceffary that the Exportation of Saltpetre, or Carrying the fame Coaftwife, should be likewife prohibited during the faid Time ; - His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby order, re-quire, prohibit, and command, That no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever (except the Mafter-General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majefly's Service) do, at any Time during the Term limited by His Majefly's aforementioned Order in Council of the 23d of August last, prefume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Saltpetre, or ship or lade any Saltpetre on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permiffion in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffris ravy council, upon rain of incurring and infering the Forfeiture and Penalty inflicted by an Act paffed in the 29th Year of His late Majefty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to impower His Ma-" jefty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-petre, " and to inforce the Law for impowering His " Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpow-" der, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and " alfo to impower His Majefty to reftrain the Carry-"ing Coaftwife of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any "Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Com-missioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may refpectively appertain.
