**O** Schwerin, September 26. N Sunday last died, after a short Illness, her Serene Highness the Princess Amelia of Mecklenburg Schwerin, youngest Sister to the Reigning Duke.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 26.* A Royal Placart was published on the 21st Instant, for regulating the Tax on Lands in Denmark for the Year 1776. Another Placart has appeared, to prohibit the Distilling of Rye into Brandy in the Cities and flat Country of Denmark, from the first of November till farther Orders.

*Berlin, Sept. 26.* Yesterday, being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia, there was a Levee in the Morning at his Royal Highness's Apartments: And her Prussian Majesty returned to this Place from Shoenhausen, to be present at a Ball and Supper given on this Occasion by her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Prussia.

On Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday last, his Prussian Majesty reviewed the Troops at and in the Neighbourhood of Potsdam.

*Hague, October 3.* The Prince and Princess of Orange, with their Children, arrived here on Saturday last; and their Serene Highnesses are all in perfect Health. The Autumnal Exercises of this Garrison began yesterday.

*Hamburg, October 3.* The Harvest is now finished in every Part of Holstein, Mecklenburg, and in this Neighbourhood. The Season has been very favourable, and the Crop is said to be the most plentiful that has ever been seen.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 23d Day of August last, to prohibit the Exportation out of this Kingdom into any Parts beyond the Seas, or Carrying Coastwise, any Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, for and during the Space of Three Months from the Date of the said Order: And whereas His Majesty judges it necessary that the Exportation of Saltpetre, or Carrying the same Coastwise, should be likewise prohibited during the said Time; — His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Term limited by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 23d of August last, presume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Saltpetre, or ship or lade any Saltpetre on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the Forfeiture and Penalty inflicted by an Act passed in the 20th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the Carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
