*Dublin Castle, October 10.*

**T**HIS Day, the Parliament having met, according to the Prorogation, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency made the following Speech to both Houses:

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*  
YOUR distinguished Loyalty to the King, your just Attention to the Honor and Dignity of His Government, and your well-regulated Zeal for the Peace and Happiness of your Country, have made so sensible an Impression on my Mind, during a three Years Residence amongst you, that, encouraged by the Experience of what I have seen, it is with the most sincere Satisfaction I meet you again in Parliament.

I am persuaded that you entertain a grateful Sense of the Blessings you enjoy under the mild and firm Government of the best of Sovereigns; and His Majesty relies on the known Zeal and Loyalty of His Subjects of Ireland, that, whilst His Government is disturbed by a Rebellion existing in a Part of His American Dominions, you will be ready to shew your inviolable Attachment to His Person and Government, in the Assertion of His just Rights, and in the Support of His legal Authority.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*  
I have ordered the proper Accounts and Estimates to be laid before you, that you may be enabled to judge of the Provisions necessary to be made for the ordinary Expenses of His Majesty's Establishments, and for discharging an Arrear which has been unavoidably incurred.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*  
I am happy to inform you, that, since your last Meeting, His Majesty's tender Concern for the Welfare of this Kingdom, hath induced him to pass several Laws in the British Parliament highly beneficial to your Commerce, your Manufactures, and your Agriculture.

By the Act which extends the great Advantages of British Fisheries to Ireland, a Source of Industry and Wealth is opened to you, which has made other Nations great and flourishing: Let me, therefore, recommend to your earnest Attention, the Improvement of Advantages, tending so obviously to promote your Navigation and Trade; in the Pursuit of which you may depend upon my warmest Assistance and Support.

The Act which allows the Cloathing and Accoutrements necessary for His Majesty's Forces, paid from the Revenues of this Kingdom, to be exported from Ireland, is a particular Mark of the Royal Favor; and even that which allows the Importation of Rape Seed into Great Britain from this Kingdom, under certain Regulations, connected with those salutary Laws passed in your last Session, form such a System of Agriculture and Improvement as will, I trust, secure Riches and Plenty to the People of Ireland.

A Bounty granted by Great Britain upon the Importation of Flax Seed is so marked a Recommendation of the Linen Manufacture, that it becomes needless for me to urge the most persevering Application to that Staple of your Country.

The Protestant Charter Schools, an Institution established on the Principles of Wisdom and Humanity, and so peculiarly adapted to the present State and Circumstances of this Kingdom, are eminently entitled to your Consideration and Care.

On my Part, you may be assured that I shall continue faithfully to represent your Loyalty and Zeal to His Majesty; and that I shall cheerfully co-operate with you in whatever may tend to advance the Prosperity and Happiness of this Kingdom.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*  
**W**E, your Majesty's faithful Subjects, the Magistrates, Incorporated Societies, and Principal Inhabitants of the Town and Port of Leith, think it our Duty on this Occasion, with unanimous Voice, to testify our Loyalty at the Foot of your Throne.

The Differences between Great Britain and some of her Colonies have now come to such a Crisis, that every Community feels itself a Part of the Nation, and every good Citizen is interested in the Publick Cause.

We cannot reflect, without Concern, on the Agitations that must have arisen in your Sacred and Paternal Breast upon this unnatural Division; nor think, without Horror, on those of your Majesty's Subjects, who have sown the Seeds of Dissension, and kindled the Flames of Civil War, between one Part of your Majesty's Dominions and another.

Attached to that Order flowing from good Government, which is the Basis of Human Felicity, and fully satisfied with that Liberty which is derived from the Laws, we look upon the audacious Attempts to overturn our happy Constitution, with Indignation, and abhor the vile Artifices that are used to alienate the Affections of your People from the best of Sovereigns.

Sensible of the great Increase of our Trade and Commerce, and certain that Industry, when cherished by Liberty and protected by Valour, will ever be crowned with Success, our Hearts overflow with Gratitude for the Happiness we enjoy under your Majesty's Government; and we rest with Confidence upon the Wisdom and Rectitude of your Majesty's Measures, for bringing the present unhappy Differences to a Conclusion, which shall be consistent with the Honour of Great Britain.

But if our unhappy and deluded Fellow Subjects in America shall continue in their unnatural and unprovoked Rebellion, with our Fortunes and with our Lives we will assert the Supremacy of our King and Parliament over every Part of the British Empire; and teach the Sons of Anarchy, that the same Arm, which was lately stretched out for their Defence and Security, and which drove all their Enemies far from their Borders, can with equal Ease chastise ungrateful and rebellious Subjects; happy that the Rod is in the most mild and merciful Hand, in the Hand of the Father and Friend of his People.

*Stockholm, September 26.* A new Ordinance is published relative to the Distillation of Brandy, whereby his Majesty not only confirms the general Prohibition of it, but also doubles the Penalty; and likewise prohibits all Importation of Brandy and Spirits from the first of next January.

His Swedish Majesty set out Yesterday for Carlscrona, attended by the Senators Ulrich Scheffer and Liewen, and by several principal Officers of the Household, making in the whole a Suite of Ninety Persons. His Journey, Stay, and Return, will be four Days each.

*Florence, September 26.* The Great Duke and the Archduke Maximilian returned on the 22d from a Tour they had made to Pisa, Leghorn, and Lucca.

*St. Ildephonso, September 28.* The Court will remove to the Escorial in the Course of next Week; and the Princefs

Princess of Acurio is much better than she was when she arrived here.

*Copenhagen, October 3.* On the 21st of last Month another Decree was published, to renew and enforce That by which the Importation of foreign Earthen and Stone Ware was prohibited in the Dutchies of Sleswick and Holstein, the Lordship of Pinneberg, and County of Rantzau.

An Advertisement has been lately published here by the College of Pilots, of which the following is a Translation:

*Translation of an Advertisement, published by the Danish College of Pilots, September 26, 1775.*

It having been already advertised in the News-Papers, that an unexpected and very remarkable Change has happened on the Logstoer-Grounds in the Limford, the Depth of the Water being considerably augmented by the hard Weather in the Night between the 28th and 29th of March this Year; and this Change having been very carefully examined by me, in Pursuance of an Order sent to me from the Chamber of Finances of the West Indies and Guinea, the following Marks have been placed for the Direction of Navigators:

1. When a Ship approaches the Logstoer-Grounds, and Sail-Depths, from the Westward, and is to pass them, the North Course is at present to be taken by those who are going Eastward. On the North-Hook, in the North Course from the Westward, is laid a Sea-Tun, which is large, and easy to be seen, in Six Feet Water. It is to be found in the East, on the Compass.

2. On the high Land South of Aggersfund's-Hill, on the Fields of Tholstrup, Two Land-Marks are to be seen; the Westernmost is an upright Mark with a square Table on the Top of it, Three Ells (or Six Feet) Square, and white-washed. The Easternmost has the Figure of a Pyramid, broad below and pointed at Top, and is also white-washed. At the Top of it is placed a Tun, set upright on one End, with Stakes across through both Ends, which are tarred. Along the Slope where the two Land-Marks stand, there is a Trench dug in the same Direction with both the Land-Marks, which looks white by reason of the chalky Ground of the Cliff. These Marks are at a proper Distance from each other, for Persons to distinguish easily when they are out of the Line of Direction. When the Sea-Tun is kept Easterly, you must not come nearer than in Nine or Ten Foot Water, then steer Southward until the Two Marks, set upon Land, are brought into One. You may fail in that Direction till you have the Tun opposite to you in the North, where in daily and common Water you will not find less than Six and an Half Feet Water in that Course of Steering, which is the deepest Channel, and increases gradually to the Westward, without Fear of any Banks.

3. On the East Point of the Middle Grounds is laid a Buoy-wager, in eight Feet Water, for the Information of Navigators who are going from the West, through the North Course from the Sea Tun, Eastward, and also of those who come from the East, to pitch directly on the North Course, in order not to mistake and run into the South Channel.

4. In Spring and Fall, if the Sea-Tun should be taken in, (which is always done, as long as there is any Ice to be apprehended in the Shoal Waters) Navigators coming from the West, and approaching the Northern Channel or Sail-Depths of Logstoers, must remember to look for the Two Land-Marks raised on Tholstrup Cliffs, and bring them into One, continuing this Course till Malle Church is seen between the Houses of Lendrup, where they will find the Longitude of the Place of the Sea-Tun. From thence the Course runs Eastward through the North Channel.

*Berlin, October 3.* M. de Massow, Minister of State in the Revenue Department, died, universally regretted, on the 24th Instant, after a short Illness; and the Day following Lieutenant-General Watersleben departed this Life in an advanced Age.

*Turin, October 5.* On Saturday last their Sardinian Majesties, and their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Piedmont, arrived at this Place in the Evening, from the Castle of Rivoli, escorted by two Detachments of the Horse-Guards, and three Regiments of Dragoons: The Streets from the Porta di Sufa to the Palace were lined by different Companies of the Burglers dressed in new Uniforms upon this Occasion; and upon the Place Chateau the Garrison, consisting of ten Battalions, paraded. The whole City was illuminated according to the different Orders of Architecture of each Building, which had a very fine Effect, and made a very splendid Appearance. Upon their Sar-

dinian Majesties Arrival at the Palace, the Ladies were admitted to kiss the Princess of Piedmont's Hand: As soon as that Ceremony was over, a most magnificent Firework, representing Mount Cenis, was played off. On Sunday there was a publick Entertainment at Turin, and in the Evening a Circle, which was exceeding brilliant. On Monday the Grand Opera began, the Theatre was illuminated, and the greatest Care had been taken to procure the most capital Performers in Italy.

Yesterday their Sardinian Majesties dined in Publick: Tomorrow there will be a grand Drawing-Room at Court in the Evening, on Friday a Concert, and on Saturday a Ball. These Entertainments, with some little Variation, will continue till the 17th of this Month.

*Dresden, October 8.* On the 30th of last Month their Serene Highnesses, and the whole Electoral Family, returned to Dresden from Pilnitz, for the Winter: Her Electoral Highness the Reigning Electress is perfectly recovered of her Indisposition.
