Calais, November 15. The Cranbrook of London, Burthen 500 Tons, Charles Suttie, Master, laden with Cloth, Bales, and fundry other Merchandize, bound for Jamaica, having been wrecked about Eight o'Clock, Yesterday Morning, on the Goodwin Sands off Deal, Mr. Suttie, with four others, betook themselves to the Mr. Suttie, with four others, betook themselves to the Pinnace, whilst the rest of the Crew and the Passengers got into the Long Boat; which last was, between Three and Four in the Asternoon, Yesterday, driven ashore on the Coast of Sangatte, off Fort Lapin, having on board Thirty Persons, Mariners and Passengers: As soon as the People on Shore discovered the Long Boat in the Road, driving at the Mercy of the Winds and Waves, they slocked to the Coast, in order to be ready to give immediate Assistance to the unfortunate People, and by their Diligence and Activity most of the Persons were faved, after having been exposed for Six Hours to the Violence of the Storm.

Monfit ur Porquet, the Commissary of the Marine at Monft or Porquet, the Commillary of the Marine at this Port, attended by a Surgeon, with the greatest Humanity, afforded all possible Assistance to the unhappy Sufferers; and, by the Use of proper Methods, a Saiter and a Negro, who were taken up with little Signs of Life, were with great Disticulty perfectly recovered. This Morring the Bodies of Mrs. White and her Negro Woman Servant were found on the Shore.
