To the KING's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful Subjects, Aldermen, Common-Councilmen, Freemen, and Inhabitants of the antient and loyal Town of Cambridge, beg Leave, with all Duty and Humility, to approach the Throne, at this important Crisis, on which we do not impertinently presume to obtrude on your Majesty our Opinions or Advice, though for it we have numerous and great Examples to plead, but desire only, together with many other of your Majesty's loyal Subjects, to express at this Time our sincere Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, our Consciousness of your Majesty's many Royal Virtues, our utter Detestation of all Rebellion, Treason, and Faction, and our steady Resolution to support your Majesty, to the utmost of our Power, against all your Enemies, whether open or concealed, both at Home and Abroad; and to assure your Majesty, that we place such intire Confidence in your Majesty's known Wisdom and Goodness, that we cannot entertain the least Doubt that such Measures, either of Vigour or Lenity, of Coercion or Indulgence, will be pursued, as are best adapted to reduce your deluded Subjects in America, now in a State of Rebellion and Anarchy, to a due Obedience to your Majesty, and Submission to the Legislature of Great Britain.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Forfar.

Most gracious Sovereign,

THE Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Forfar, filled with Sentiments of Duty to your Majesty, beg Leave to lament the unhappy Disturbances which have arisen between the Parent-State and those Subjects whom they have always wished to consider as her Friends.

Sensible of the Freedom of every Subject of Great Britain, and grateful for the Happiness we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Government, we see with Indignation those insidious Arts, by which the American Colonies have been deluded into an unlawful and unjust Desire of Independency.

But while we view with Abhorrence those seditious Individuals, who, from a violent and restless Temper, or the Impulses of Ambition, have seduced their Brethren into Rebellion, we compassionate the unhappy People, who by partial or unjust Representations have been involved in Scenes of Distress.

We flatter ourselves they have already become sensible of their Errors, and that they will gladly embrace the earliest Opportunity of returning to their Duty and Allegiance.

Should they perversely continue in Arms, however anxiously we may wish for their Friendship, we must entreat your Majesty to adopt such Measures as shall appear necessary to enforce a due Obedience to the Laws and Constitution of Great-Britain.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we shall readily contribute, with our Lives and Fortunes, to suppress the Rebellion in your Colonies. To bring about so desirable an Event is one of the most ardent Wishes of our Hearts, and is only secondary to our Ambition to testify on every Occasion our Duty and Attachment to your Majesty.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Orders in Council of the 23d of August and 27th of September last, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this Instant November; and whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October last, and of the 6th of this Instant, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders:



ders:—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit, and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Matter-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do at any Time, during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d of this Instant November, pretend to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or any Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or Ship or Lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October last, and 6th of this Instant November, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or his Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Constantinople, October 17. Prince Repnin, Ambassador from the Court of Petersburg, arrived here on the 15th Instant, with his Lady and three Daughters. Yesterday the Ambassador made his Publick Entry into this City with great Parade and Splendor. He was accompanied from the Frontiers, until he entered the City, by a Pascha of two Tails; the Drugoman of the Porte was sent to meet him three Days before his Arrival, together with the Chief Custom, the Captain of the Corps of Chiaufes being ill, and not able to attend the Prince on the Day of his Publick Entry, another Officer was substituted to Act in that Station. As a Compliment from the Vizir, between five and six Hundred Janissaries and Chiaufes, with two Colonels of the Janissaries, two Capigi Paschas, the Capigilar Cheiafi or Master of the Ceremonies, and some other Officers, who preceded his Retinue, which consisted of 150 Soldiers with their Bayonets fixed, and about as many other Persons, Officers and Gentlemen of his Suite, as likewise a Band of Musick, sixteen led Horses richly caparisoned, and three State Coaches. The Prince entered the City on Horseback at the Gate of Adrianople, passed through the outward-Part of Constantinople near the Walls, and after making a pretty large Circuit from Daoud Pascha, (which Place he left about Eight o'Clock in the Morning) arrived in perfect Health at Pera about Six in the Evening.

Hague, November 21. The Effects of the late Storm of the 14th Instant appear by Accounts from all Parts of this Province to have been much more dreadful than was at first apprehended. Commerce has suffered greatly by the many Vessels lost on our Coasts, near the Texel; in the Zuyder Sea, at the Mouth of the Maese, and more particularly on the Sea-Coast of Holland, which is in many Places covered with Wrecks and Merchandize. The Violence of the North West Wind, (which blew on the 14th the whole Day) had raised the Tide in the Morning to a very uncommon Height; and the Waters on the Ebb being prevented by the Continuance of the Storm, from returning, in the Evening were increased to such a Degree as to occasion Inundations in many Parts of North and South Holland, and even in the Province of Utrecht. Among the Towns partly or entirely overflowed, are those of Amsterdam; Munikendam, Edam, Horn, Dort, Rotterdam, Beverwyk, Delfhaven, and Maassluys. All the District in the Neighbourhood of Heusden was under Water, as also the Country bordering on the River Y between Harlem and Amsterdam, and on the opposite Shore of that River in North Holland, and the Country lying at the Mouth of the Maese near Rotterdam, particularly the Islands of Blankenbourg and Roofenbourg: The Force of the Wind and Waves was so great, that a Ship at Amsterdam, bound to Petersburg, was carried over two Dykes between Muiden and Amerfort, and thrown to the Distance of two hundred Yards on the Land. The Dykes are damaged in many Places by this Tempest; but wherever there appeared any Breaches, the Inhabitants by their great Diligence and Activity immediately repaired them, and by that Means prevented the Ruin of the Country. But notwithstanding their Vigilance, the Waters rose above the Level of the Dykes, and overflowed the Country, carrying away with the Torrent, Houses, Cattle, Furniture, &c. and some Persons have perished. The Fishing-Towns have also suffered greatly by the Loss of their Boats. By the most exact Enquiries it has been found, that the Rise of the Waters was at this Time eight Inches higher than in the Year 1682, and two Inches higher than they were in the Year 1717. Workmen are employed in repairing the Damages; and the Communication between Harlem and Amsterdam, which had been interrupted, is now open.
