E have had a sudden Change of Weather. The Winter is set in with great Severity.

Her Imperial Majesty, whose Health is now perfectly established, proposes availing herself of the Sledge-Way, to make an Excursion to Toulou in a few Days.

Stockholm, December 1. A new Regulation is made with respect to the Manufacturing of Saltpetre, by which the Directors of the Works in the several Districts are confined to the Sums they have received from the Crown; and they are obliged to deliver in a certain yearly Quantity in Proportion to those Advances.

Berlin, December 5. His Prussian Majesty still continues at Sans Souci.

The Queen of Prussia is entirely recovered from her late Indisposition, and was present in the Drawing-Room the Day before Yesterday.

The Season is very mild, and there is little Appearance of it's changing.

Vienna, December 6. On Sunday Morning a Courier arrived here from Naples with the News of her Sicilian Majesty's having been safely delivered of a Princess: Upon which Occasion there was a Drawing-Room and Gala last Night at Court.
