From Denmark our advices tell us, that the Suedes continue absolute Masters of the Field in Schonen ; that they had arracked the Caffle ar Helfingburg, and though they had been repulsed, yet it is feared it will at last fall into the Enemies hands. Since the conclusion of the Peace between the Poles and the Turks, the Molcovites feem absolutely refolved to conrinue the friendship and good correspondence with the Grown of Sueden, and to have rather an inclination of

entring into a War against the Poles. Paris, Jan. 13. We have had feveral reports here concerning the taking of Melazzo and Catanea in Sicity by the Duke de Vivonne, but they need aconfirma. tion before we give credit to them. Our Troops contique to march towards #landers, for which this reafon is given, that fince the Kingwho as he does not require any Contributions from the Spanish Subjects, fo likewife will not permit his Subjects to pay any, thinks it necessary to have the faid Troops march towards those parts, to fecure them against the Enemy, and to prevent their executions, which they will otherwife make, to oblige the Inhabitants to pay the Contributions they de-mand.
