A PROCLAMATION,  
For Encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on Board  
His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Tw.nty-ninth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Forty Shillings each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque, residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen: And We do declare, That the Qualifications of the Seamen so entering themselves, as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And, for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the Third Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-six, in the Sixteenth Year of Our Reign.

The following Address of the Nobility, Freeholders and Heritors of the Shire of Edinburgh, having been transmitted to the Earl of Suffolk, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Edinburgh, January 4, 1776.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Nobility, Freeholders and Heritors of the Shire of Edinburgh.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Nobility, Freeholders and Heritors of the Shire of Edinburgh this Day assembled, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person, in order to express Sentiments, which, as British Freeholders, we should be ashamed not to feel at this interesting Juncture.

Happy ourselves under the Government of a Sovereign, whose Reign has been distinguished by an uniform Attention to the Constitutional Rights of his People, and Witnesses of the Blessings, which a mild and equitable Administration hath diffused over an Empire more extensive than was ever subject to any Monarch of Great Britain, we observed, with deep Regret, the first Appearances of an aspiring ungodenable Spirit, which tended not only to alienate the American Colonies from the Parent-State, but to weaken their Sense of the Obedience due to your Majesty's just Authority, and to the Supreme Jurisdiction of Parliament.

We have since beheld, with Astonishment, the fatal Progress of this Spirit, which, by exciting groundless Jealousies and Fears, hath precipitated a deluded People into a Rebellion no less audacious than unjustifiable.

We rejoice, however, in that becoming Zeal with which the British Legislature has asserted those Rights, which must belong to the Supreme Power in every Society; and we trust, that the Determinations of Parliament will be enforced by such vigorous and persevering Efforts as may be sufficient to re-establish its Sovereign Jurisdiction. For although we admire those Sentiments of Paternal Affection, which animate your Royal Breast, with regard to your deluded Subjects in America, we are fully persuaded, that Clemency can never be exercised with Safety, nor received with Gratitude, till once the Power of Great Britain is felt, and its Authority acknowledged in every Part of your Majesty's Dominions.

We should deem ourselves deficient in our Duty, if we did not join our Voice to that of our loyal Fellow-Subjects in every Corner of the Nation, in declaring our fixed Purpose of supporting your Majesty to the utmost of our Power, while thus engaged in vindicating the Honour of your Crown, and maintaining the just Rights of the Constitution.

May your Majesty be long preserved to reign over a free and grateful People.
