HE following Address of the Deacon Conveener, Deacons of the Fourteen Incorpo-rated Trades, and other Members of the Trades Houfe, of the City of Glafgow, has been prefented to His Majefty by the Right Honourable Lord Frederick Campbell, their Representative in Parliament, being introduced by the Lord of His Majefty's Bed-chamber in Waiting : Which Address His Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioully.

To the KING's Moft Excellent Majefty,

Moft Gracious Sovereign, X7 E, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Deacon Conveener, Deacons of the Fourteen Incorporated Trades, and other Members of the Trades Houle, of the City of Glafgow, at a Gene-ral Meeting affembled, impressed with the most unalterable Sentiments of Loyalty and Affection to your Ma-jefty's Perfon and Government, humbly beg Leave, at this Time, with unfeigned Hearts, to express our Abhorrence and Deteftation of that unprovoked and unnatural Rebellion now prevailing in some of your Ma-jefty's Colonies in America. To levy War against their Sovereign, acknowledged to be the best of Kings; against the Government, who has always protected them when in Danger, and defended them from the Attacks of Foreign Enemies; against the Nation from which they forung, and against their Friends and Fellowthey forung, and against their Friends and renow-Subjects; all for the most frivolous Causes that ever ex-cited Sedition; indicates too strongly their Intention to fhake off, and not be governed by, the Laws of Great Britain, which, we firmly believe, they are bound to obey. We, however, have the Pleafure of informing your Majefty, that, notwithftanding of this unnatural Rebellion, our Trade and Manufactures in general are in a prosperous State; and, as we have hitherto enjoyed all the Blessings and Advantages which have flowed all the Bleflings and Advantages which have nowch from your Majefty's juft, wife; and prudent Admini-ftration; fo, in Duty, we from the Sincerity of our Hearts declare, that with our Lives and Fortunes we will fupport and defend your Majefty's Perfon and Go-vernment, to the utmost of our Power, in quelling the unnatural Rebellion now fublisting in America; and in reftoring the Rebellious Colonies to a due Submiffion to the Laws and Government of Great Britain.

Signed in our Prefence, and by our Appointment, by John Craig, Deacon Conveener of the Trades of the City of Glafgow, at Glafgow, the Tenth Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-fix Years. John Craig.
