HEREAS, by Our Royal Proclamation, given at Our Court at Saint James's, the Twenty-fourth Day of June, in the Fourteenth Year of Our Reign, We did think proper to give Notice to all Our loving Subjects, that fo foon as the Occasions of Circulation would allow, We should issue Our surfer Proclamation for calling in and recoining all Guineas weighing less than Five Penny-weights Eight Grains, and all smaller Pieces of Gold Coin deficient in the same Proportion; We do therefore, by this Our Royal Proclamation, think sit, in the First Place, to declare and command, and We do declare and command, That from and after the First Day of May next, no Guineas, Half-guineas, or Quarter-guineas, more desicient in Weight than the Rates specified in the Table following; viz.

Guineas coined prior to the First of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-two, - - - 2 16
Half-guineas, during the same Period, - 2 16
Quarter-guineas, during the same Period, 1 8
be allowed to be current, or to pass in any Payment whatsoever, within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, except in Payments to be made at the Receipt of Our Exchequer, or to the Collectors or Receivers of Our Revenues in Great Britain, or to the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, or to such other Person or Persons as shall be appointed by the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury, or any Three of them, to receive and exchange the same, such Appointment to be published in the London Gazette.

And We do strictly require and command the Tellers of Our Exchequer, and all the Collectors and Receivers of Our Taxes and Revenues within Our faid Kingdom of Great Britain, from the faid First Day of May next, to the Nineteenth Day of August next inclusive, to take and receive, in Payment and Discharge of Our Revenues and Taxes, such of the faid deficient Gold Coin of Our Realm as shall be so tendered to them, so as the Desiciency of every Piece thereof doth not exceed the Rates specified in the Table hereafter sollowing; viz.

And we do strictly require and enjoin the Tellers of Our Exchequer, and the said Receivers General resident in London and Westminster, during the said Twenty-one Days and Twenty-eight Days respectively, and no longer, to receive from the Collectors and Receivers resident in the Country alone, and from no other Person, the said descient Gold Coin of Our Realm, in Payment and Discharge of the several Branches of Our Revenues and Taxes, so as that every Piece of such Gold Coin be not more descient in Weight than is specified in the Table last-mentioned.

St. James's, April 16. The following Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, Common Council, Merchants, Traders, and Principal Inhabitants, of the City of Corke, having been transmitted to Lord Viscount Weymouth, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been presented to His Majesty; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very gracioufly.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty.

E, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Sheriffs, Common Council, Merchants, Traders, and Principal Inhabitants, of the City of Corke, humbly approach your Royal Pre-fence, to declare our Abhorrence of the unnatural Rebellion now carrying on in North America by many of your Majesty's deluded Subjects.

We were in Hopes your Majesty's Paternal Admonitions, and the Restraining Laws made by your Majesty and your Parliament, would have brought these infatuated People to a Sense of their Daty without shedding of Blood; but we are forry to find, that your Majesty's Clemency hath made them more daring in their lawless Attempts; and that, under the Cloak of Liberty, they have exercised every Species of Licentiousness, not only making offensive War against your Majesty, but plundering the Property of your Majesty's peaceable Subjects who are

refident

resident amongst them, and driving them from their Habitations.

As your Majesty, thus circumstanced, is obliged to make Use of the Power of your Empire to reduce, by Force of Arms, this dangerous Rebellion; we, on our Part, do most chearfully engage, with our Lives and Fortunes; to stand by and support your Majesty's Person and Government, as well against these Insurgents, as against all other Enemies whatsoever.
