Petersburgh, July 19.

YESTERDAY Morning at Eleven o'Clock the Empress, attended by many of the Great Officers of State and Household, went in a magnificent Barge from Oranienbaum to Admiral Greig's Ship. Her Imperial Majesty was welcomed by Cheers from each of the Men of War as she passed them, the Yards, &c. being manned at her Approach. As soon as the Empress went on Board the Admiral's Ship, the Imperial Standard was hoisted; upon which the whole Fleet saluted by a general Discharge of their Cannon, as did likewise the Fortifications of Cronstadt, which mount nine hundred Guns. The Admiral's Ship returned the Salute of the Fleet; which Honour was acknowledged by each Ship's firing Half their Number of Guns. After the Empress had dined at a Table of one Hundred Covers with the principal Officers of the Marine and other Departments, and many Persons of the First Distinction, a Signal was made for the whole Fleet to weigh Anchor; and her Imperial Majesty, attended by the Prince and Count Alexis Orlov, Field Marshal Galitzin, and Count Bruce the Adjutant on Duty, rowed along the Line of the Fleet in her Barge, being again saluted by a general Discharge from the Men of War and Batteries; after which her Imperial Majesty went on Board one of the Yachts, sailed for a short Time with the Fleet, and returned between Six and Seven o'Clock to Oranienbaum.

Admiral Greig was presented with the Order of St. Alexander Newsky.

Petersburg, July 16. Count Skavronsky, many Years Grand Master of her Imperial Majesty's Household, died last Week at his Estate in this Neighbourhood, and was Yesterday interred in the Chapel of the Convent of St. Alexander Newsky.

Constantinople, July 3. Advice has been received here, that on the 16th of April last the City of Baffora had surrendered to the Persians by Capitulation, after a Siege of more than twelve Months, the Inhabitants being reduced to the last Extremity by Sickness and Famine.

Berlin, August 3. His Imperial Highness the Grand Duke of Russia was received at Potsdam with the same Pomp and Solemnity as at Berlin. On Monday he sets out for Rhinsberg, the Country Residence of his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia, where he proposes remaining three Days, and then continuing his Journey to Petersburgh.

Hamburg, August 6. Last Friday Evening the Dutchess of Mecklenbourg-Schwerin arrived in perfect Health at her Hotel in this City, and the Day before yesterday in the Afternoon all the Foreign Ministers and Nobility here waited upon her Serene Highness.

Paris, August 7. On Sunday Night her Royal Highness the Countess d'Artois was safely delivered of a Daughter.—Her Royal Highness and the young Princess are both as well as can be expected.

The Prince of Conti died on Saturday Afternoon, and is to be buried this Day at L'Isle-Adam.

Hague, August 8. We hear from Loo, that the Anniversary of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange's Birth-day, was celebrated there yesterday; and that her Royal Highness wore the Order of St. Catherine.
