The KING's Moff Excellent Majelty in Council. IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament, which fands prorogued to Thurfday the 5th Day of September next, fhould be further pro-rogued to Tuefday the 15th Day of October following.

Requiring Palfes, formerly granted to Ships and Vef-fels trading in the Way of the Critizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, 10 be returned into the Office of the Admirally of Great Britain, and other Palfes of different Forms " to be iffued.

GEORGE R,

WHEREAS, by Our Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fecond Day of February, in the Fifth Year of Our Reign, We did charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who then were, or fhould be, poffeffed of any Paffes for Ships and Veffels belonging to Our Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elsewhere, in the Way of the Cruizers of the Government of Algiers (except fuch Paffes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with new Passes) that they flouid, before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and fixty fix, return the fame, and furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commiffioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, in fuch Manner as by the faid recited Proclamation was directed : And where is it hath been humbly reprefented unto Us, that there is the greatest Reason to believe, that many of Our Pafles may, either by Accident or un-due Means, have fallen into the Hands of Foreign-ers, who by Colour of fuch Pafles may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premifes into Our Royal Confideration, and judging it, neceffary to put a fpeedy Stop to all fuch indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of Our trading Subjects, but may occasion a Misunderlianding between Us and the Governments on the Coaft of Barbary, for preventing thereof have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby de-clare, That all fuch Paffes of the prefent Form, now in being, shall not continue in Force longer than till the Thirty-first Day of August, One thou-ford four hour for the prefent form. fand feven hundred and feventy-feven, (except fuch Paffes as have been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with new Passes; and that in fuch Cafe, the Paffes of the prefent Form do continue in Force for Two Years, from and after the faid Thirty first Day of August, One thousand feven hundred and leventy-feven). Ånd We do hereby ftricily charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who are or shall be possesfied of any fuch Passes, that they do, before the Thirty first Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and Seventy-feven, return the fame (except fuch as are

AT the Court at St. James's, the 28th Day of Au- | before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of Our Customs at the Out-ports of Great Britain and Ire-. land, or to the Governors of fome of Our Foreign Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with Paffes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of Our Commiffioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, according to the Treaty fubfilling between Us and the faid Governments on the Coafts of Barbary, and the Re-gulations made by Our Royal Predeceffor King George the First, by Order in His Privy Council, on the Fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, so far as the fame remain unaltered by the Regulations this Day made by Us in Our Council, and according to the further Regulations then there made, and Our Infructions given to Our faid Commissioners for ex-ecuting the Office of High Admiral of Great Bri-tain and Ireland touching the fame. And whereas many Ships and Veffels belonging to Our loving Subjects continue feveral Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean without returning Home, whereby they cannot fo conveniently procure their Paffes to be exchanged; We do hereby, for the Eafe of Our trading Subjects, publish and declare Our Pleasure, That upon the Application of any Owner of any Ship or Veffel, or other fubitantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and Oath made by him of the Property of fuch Ship or Veffel, and that Three-fourths of the Company are Veilei, and that I free-fourths or the Company are Our Subjects, according to an Act, made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Our Royal Predecef-for King Charles the Second, (intituled, An Act for incouraging and increasing of Shipping and Navi-gation) and upon entering into a Bond for the Re-turn of fuch Pals at the End of Three Years, or of the Yourge, if that thall forcing determine, it fould the Voyage, if that shall fooner determine, it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for exe-cuting the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Bri-tain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively impowered to make out a new Pais for fuch Ship or Vessel, and fend the fame to fuch of Our Confuls in the Mediterranean, as the faid Owner or Merchant shall defire, with Direction to fuch Conful, that, upon Application to him from the Master of the Ship, for which the Pass is made out, and furrendering up his old Pafs, and entering into a like Bond for the Return of such new Pass, he shall deliver out the faid new Pass to such Master, and transmit the old one, with the Bond, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain. And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any Abuses that may be attempted by Foreigners, relating to the new Passes to be issued as aforefaid, We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That all such new Passes, to be hereaster iffued for any Ships or Veffels whatloever belonging to any of Our Subjects of the Island of Minorca or Gibtaltar, shall be made out in a peculiar Form. different from the Form of the new Passes to be iffued for Ships and Veffels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions; and that such new Passes shall be lodged with the respective Governors, Lieutenant Governors, or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the faid Ifland of Minorca and Gib-raltar, and iffued out only by them, according to the Regulations made by Our faid Royal Predeceffor

for King George the Firff, and Ourfelf, in Council, as aforefaid : And the faid respective Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Commanders in Chief, are hereby charged and required not to iffue or deliver out any fuch Paffes to any Perfons whatfoever, other than fuch as are really Our Subjects inhabiting in the faid Island of Minorca or Gibraltar respectively, and strictly to conform themselves to the Regulations and Instructions made and given as aforefaid. But in regard it fometimes happens, that Ships, be-longing to Our Subjects of other Parts of our Dominions, call in at Gibraltar and Minorca without Paffes, and have Occasion to be furnished there-with; We do, for the further Conveniency of Trade, hereby publish and declare Our Royal Will and Pleafure, That it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admi-ral of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively hereby impowered, to lodge Mediterranean Paffes, of the fame Form with the new Paffes for Ships and Veffels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions, in the Hands of Our Governors, Lieutenant Governors, or Commanders in Chief of Minorca and Gibraltar, with Directions to them to iffue and deliver out fuch Paffes to any of Our Subjects, not being Inhabitants of the faid Island of Minorca, or of Gibraltar, provided the Perfon or Perfons applying for the fame do comply with and conform to the feveral Rules and Regulations now in Use, and required to be observed by fuch Our other Subjects. And We do hereby order, That the Commiffioners of Our Customs in Great Britain, and the Commissioners of Our Revenue in Ireland, do caufe to be carried into Execution fuch Parts of the faid Order of Council of the Fourteenth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, concerning Paffes, as relate to them-felves, and the proper Officers under them, fo far as the fame remains now in Force, and of Our Or-der aforefaid, made this Day in Council; and that they do direct their Officers in the feveral Ports of Our Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, to demand of the Mafters of all Merchant Ships, fo foon as they shall return into Port from a ForeignVoyage, all Passes granted as aforefaid, which shall be in their Posseship, to be produced to the faid respec-tive Officers of Our Customs; and that if the same shall appear to be of an older Date than Twelve Months for Ships and Veffels trading on this Side the Streights Month, or for Ships and Veffels trading to a greater Diftance, in Cafe the Voyages of fuch last-mentioned Ships and Vessels shall be determined, then such Passes shall be delivered up to the faid respective Officers of Our Customs, and be by them returned to the Office of the Admiralty of Geat Britain : And in Cafe the Master of any fuch Ship or Vefiel shall refuse to produce or deliver up fuch Paffes, according to the true Intent of Our faid Order, then the faid Officers shall certify the Name of every fuch Master, and of the Ship or Vessel, to Our Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or to Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, to the End that Directions may be given for putting the Bond, entered into on the granting any fuch Pafs, in Suit : And all Our Go-vernors, Lieutenant Governors, and Commanders in Chief of any of Our Islands, Colonies, or Plansations, Confuls refiding in Foreign Parts, and all other Our Officers and Ministers whatfoever, and all other Our loving Subjects whom it may concern, are hereby expressly required and commanded to yield due Obedience unto, and firictly to observe, all the Orders, Instructions, Regulations, and Directions before mentioned, on Pain of Our High Displeasure.

7 HEREAS His Majefty was gracioufly pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fecond Day of March last, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April them following, enter themfelves to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Roard fuch Tenders as should be employed for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy : And whereas the Time thereby limited was by Orders in Council prolonged and extended from the faid Thirtieth Day of April to the Thirty first Day of this Instant. August ; and it being judged expedient for His Ma-jesty's Service, that the faid Bounties should be continued to be paid for fome longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered. That the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this Instant August to the Thirty-first Day of October next inclusive. — Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern them felves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Ma-jefty's Order in Council of the 17th of May laft, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaftwife, Gunpowder, Salt-petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this inftant August; and whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Ufe and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, and of the 5th and 19th of February laft, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coaftwife, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, un-der certain Conditions and Reftrictions mentioned in the faid Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Perfon or Perfons whomfoever (except the Mafter-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majefty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the faid 23d Day of this inftant August, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the fame beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coastwifeexcept in the Cales comprized within the afore-mentioned Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, and of the 5th and 19th of February laft, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first

obtained from His Majefty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and fuffering the respective

Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 20th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the " Exportation of Salt-petre, and to enforce the " Law for empowering His Majefty to prohibit the " Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms " and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majefty to reftrain the carrying Coaltwife of Salt-" petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Am-... " munition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treafury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secre-tary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Constantinople, July 17. The Porte has deposed Spanachgee Zadee, Pascha of Bagdat, (with whose Conduct the Inhabitants were extremely diffatisfied) and has fubstituted in his Room Abdullah the Cheaia of the late Omar Pafcha.

Petersburg, August z. Her Imperial Majesty has been pleased to beitow on Monf. Moussin Pouschkin, (the Empress's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, who is now here) for his Life and that of his Lady, an Estate in Livonia of between three and four Thousand Roubles a Year. Peterfburg, August 2. The following is an Ac-

To Vice Admiral and Intendant General Nafimoff Leave is granted to quit the Service on Account of his bad State of Health; but he is to continue to enjoy his Appointments, with Permiffion to re-enter into the Service when his Health is re-established.

To Vice-Admiral Greig, for his good and faithful Services, the Order of St. Alexander Newsky.

To Major-General Hanibal, Master of the Naval Ordnance, the Post of Grand Master; and to the Superintendant Rabinin, the Post of Intendant-General.

Four Brigadiers were advanced to the Rank of Major-General; and according to the Naval Regulations to caft Lots for the vacant Post of Rear-Admiral.

Monf. Kinfbergen is among the Captains of the Second Rank who were promoted to that of First Captain.

There was befides a great Promotion of Officers of inferior Rank; and Penfions were granted to feveral retiring from the Service.

Peterfburg, August 6. On Sunday last the Em-prefs received, by a Courier from the Great Duke, the News of his Imperial Highness being betrothed to the Princels of Wirtemberg; on which joyful Occasion there was a Ball at Court: And Yesterday Morning early Count Goertz arrived with Compliments of Congratulation from the King of Pruffia to her Imperial Majesty on the same happy Event.

The Empress intends removing this Afternoon from Peterhoff to Zarfco-Zelo.

Count Moncenigo, an Italian Gentleman, who had suffered much in h's Posseffiens, particularly in the Venetian Islands, on Account of the Affiltance he afforded the Ruffians during the late War, is appointed Commissary General of the Russian

Navy and Trade in Italy, and is to refide at Pita. Stockholm, August 9. Count Frolich, Governor of the Province of Halland, has obtained Leave to refign in Favour of Lieutenant Colonel Tott. The Regiment, from which Colonel Gyllenf-

wahn was removed, has been conferred upon Baron Stenbock, Lieutenant Colonel of the Guards.

His Swedifn Majefty, with the younger and more active Part of the Court, dwell at present in Tents in the Neighbourhood of Eckolfund, to be ready to attend during the Cool of the Morning to the Ex-ercife of Tilting. Towards the End of the Month

there wilt be a magnificent Tournament. Florence, August 10. A Courier arrived here two Florence, August 10. Days ago from Petersburg with the Ensigns of the Order of St. Ann of Holstein for General Hanibal, who has refided at Pifa fince the Conclusion of the War, with a Commission to fettle the Affairs relating to the Prizes, which the Ruffians, during the Courfe of it, made of Neutral Ships in the Archipelago.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Ostrogothia arrived here early this Morning ; and, after a few Hours Repole, proceeded to the Baths near Pifa.

Vienna, August 10. On Monday last the Empress Queen, together with the Archdutchess her Daughters, and the whole Court, were prefent at the Military Manœuvres of the Troops encamped at Laxemburg. A flight Indisposition prevented the Empress from being present at the second Ma-nœuvre on Wednesday last, but Yesterday her Im-perial Majesty appeared in perfect Health at Schonbrunn.

Vienna, August 14. The Emperor fet out from this Capital for the Camp at Pest last Night at Ten o'Clock. His Imperial Majesty will return on the 27th Inftant, and on the 5th of September the Grand Duke and Dutchefs of Tufcany will take Leave of this Court, and begin their Journey towards their own Dominions.

The Princefs Cunigunda, Dresden, August 18. Awat to his Serene Highness the Elector of Saxony who about two Years ago was elected Coadjutrix of Thorn and Effen, is now named Abbels thereof.

Berlin, August 20. His Prussian Majesty, atsended by General Prittwitz, left Potzdam on Wednesday last the 14th Instant, in order to review his Troops in Silefia : His Royal Highness the Prince of Pruffia set out the preceding Evening ; and the fame Day the Prince's of Pruffia arrived here

Hague, August 25. This Day being the Anni-versary of the Birth of his Serene Highness William Frederick Hereditary Prince of Orange, who entered into the Fifth Year of his Age, the fame was observed here in the usual Manner.
